OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis Jan. 7.—A. E. Harris of Brooks, Or. was elected president of the Oregon State Drainage association at the annual meeting held here and attended by 40 men representing practically all parts of Oregon.

Directors chosen were: Central Oregon, Percy Purvis, Vale; Blue mountain region, George T. Cochran, La Grande; Columbia basin, T. G. Smith, Echo, Willamette valley, W. L. Powers, Corvallis; southern Oregon, Elmer I. Applegate, Klamath Falls; coast region, Roy C. Jones, Tillamook, and delegate-at-large, J. O. Ebrod, Portland.

Sam H. Brown was chosen chairman of the legislative committee. The other members chosen were W. E. Wilson, Salem; Ralph Schnedock, Portland; Colon R. Eberhard, La Grande; J. E. Roman, Astoria; Percy A. Cupper, Salem, and W. S. Slough, Klamath Falls.

A meeting in Portland from January 8 to January 10 is to be attended by the old and new officers and others, after which a field day and excursion over the diking projects will be arranged for early in June.

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BIG CORN CROP

JUAREZ, Mex., Jan. 7.—The corn crop in the state of Chihuahua during 1919 amounted to 1,986,000 bushels, as compared to 1,627,000 bushels in 1918 and 1,828,000 in 1909. The state statistician reports that these figures are probably 20 per cent below the actual crop, and that this year's yield, in spite of many difficulties, is larger than the pre-revolution crop.

GOOD SEASON FOR ALASKAN MINERS

SEWARD, Alaska, Dec. 2. (By Mail)—The mining season of 1919 was a successful one for miners and operators in the Alaskan interior, according to Captain W. Langley, a steamer pilot, here recently on his way to Seattle to spend the winter. Many miners who had made little or nothing the previous year, "came back strong" with good cleanups last summer and fall, Captain Langley said.

According to Captain Langley, there is plenty of food stored in the upper Kuskokwim river section to last until the arrival of boats in the spring. He carried four capacity cargoes up the river on the steamer Tana during the season.
