ARMY FOOD SALE IS SET TO MUSIC

HONOLULU, T. H., Jan. 13.—(By Mail.)—Honolulu sold its allotment of surplus army food to the accompaniment of fox trots, one-steps, and military marches played by the Hawaiian Band.

While the band played, the people bought army beans, bacon, and other staples at prices far below the market quotations. Later it was discovered, when the invoices arrived, that these prices were ten per cent above what it was necessary to charge. A reduction accordingly was made and the surplus ten per cent already taken in was given to city charitable institutions.

PROHIBITION RULE HITS SOUTH SEAS

APIA, British Samoa, Nov. 10.—(By Mail.)—Acting in the exercise of the mandatory powers granted by the League of Nations, the New Zealand government has published proclamation prohibiting the importation of intoxicating beverages in western Samoa.

The proclamation came as a shock to the white residents, who have held an indignation meeting.

Natives have been prohibited from receiving or drinking intoxicants for the past 40 years.

QUAREZ, Mex., Jan. 13.—The Hamburg-American Steamship Company has established weekly service between Hamburg and Vera Cruz, according to information received here by Edward A.
