## FOREST POLICY IS BIG NEED

NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—Plans to conserve the timber supply of the United States through a national forest policy, in order to meet the future demands of industry, were adopted today at the annual meeting of the American Forestry association. The programme includes extension of federal holdings, co-operation with states in fire protection and silviculture, forest taxation and insurance loans on growing timber, land classification and forest supply and search.

"Let us have a national forest policy," said Charles Lathrop Peck, president of the association, "so the time may never come when other nations may see us helpless and find us easy to attack. The great lesson of the forests of France must be born home to the people of this country. There a national forest policy of 125 years' standing answered when the call came."

He declared 25 years "is about the limit of supply under our present system of waste, or rather lack of system with the forests—our greatest national resources."

Asserting that industry will make great inroads into the present timber supply, even more than did the war, Mr. Peck said:

"We must now, at once, provide for forest crops for the future. The center of the timber industry is fast moving to the Pacific coast. What that means to a 'build-a-home' campaign east of the Alleghenies is easily seen in high freight rates and prohibitive costs."

"Lake states now import lumber for their industries," he added, "and the New England states are no longer self-supporting. We must have a national forest policy without delay."

Mr. Peck was re-elected president.

### CALIFORNIA NEWS

WOODLAND, Jan. 16.—Thirty-five per cent of the school children of California are deprived of proper food and care, and the average child has only one-fourth to one-half as much milk as it should have.

So declared Will C. Wood, State Superintendent of Schools, when he addressed a meeting of the Town and Country Club, a women's organization, here.

REDDING, Jan. 16.—Redding's first Park Commission has organized by electing Superior Judge J. E. Barber, chairman, S. C. Baker is secretary.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 16.—Dbuglas Tilden, sculptor, creator of many statues commemorative of Pacific coast history, has become a machinist in a San Francisco factory. A lack of appreciation of art asserted itself shortly after the European war began, he said today, and drove him into another line of endeavor to earn a livelihood.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 16.—Floyd Leo McClure and William Chastain, who pleaded guilty last week to the murder of Anton Schoombs, a San Francisco police department detective, have been sentenced to life imprisonment in San Quentin penitentiary.

ORLAND, Jan. 16.—Nels Peterson, employed by P. D. Bane, local rancher, is in a critical condition in a Chico hospital as the result of burns sustained, when he came in contact with a live wire while working on the ranch with Bane.

ALTURAS, Jan. 16.—In a rabbit drive near Centerville, ten miles from here, over 700 rabbits were killed. The rabbits were sold and shipped to a San Francisco firm. The sale of the rabbits together with the bounty on the same will net nearly \$200. The money will be turned over to the Trustees of the County Park at Alturas.

CHICO, Jan. 16.—A new brand of cigarettes distributed by Morphine peddlers and sold to school children, has been uncovered here. This is according to a statement credited to W. H. Marshall, local Health Officer, who is conducting an investigation.

WILLOWS, Jan. 16.—Despondent over ill health and brooding over the death of her sister, who succumbed to an ailment similar to her own, Miss Annie Ellis, daughter of George Ellis, rancher residing six miles west of this city, ended her life early Sunday by shooting.

MODESTO, Jan. 16.—Miss Mayme Helm, pretty 19-year-old Fresno girl, was found dead Monday morning under a bed in the Waterford hotel, east of here, and the police are endeavoring to untangle a web of mysterious circumstances surrounding her death.

DUNSMUIR, Jan. 16.—Marshal Sam Fiske Monday captured Harold W. Bascom, aged 19, on the charge he stole a seven-passenger automobile from in front of a hotel in Oakland, and has since been using the machine in carrying passengers between towns in this section.

Bascom tried to trade a lap robe for gasoline at a local garage. Fiske followed the youth in his automobile, and caught him between Sisson and Weed.

### PROHIBITION SAVES LIFE OF HORSE

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 16.—Prohibition saved the life of a horse here the other day, officers of the San Francisco Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals reported.

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Jan. 16.—Vast treasures of silver and gold, stolen by bandits over a period of many years, are cached in the mountains of Chihuahua, Mexico, and in the remote and wild sections of the Mexican states of Durango, San Luis Potosi and Zacatecas, according to American mining men who have been investigating operation of foreign-owned mines in bandit-ridden sections of the southern republic.
