**VON HINDENBURG TO BE WEALTHY**

BERLIN, Dec. 28.—(By Mail).—Field Marshal von Hindenburg bids fair to become a millionaire from his writings, according to the new Berlin Gazette. It is reported that he has sold some of his works in America for \$12,000, which, at present exchange, would amount to about 2,000,000 marks.

**GERMAN WAGE RISE**

COLOGNE, Dec. 28.—(By Mail).—The average daily wage of workmen in Germany has increased 241 per cent, and of women 263 per cent since 1914, according to the Imperial Workers Gazette of Germany. The greatest increase was in the case of the electrical industry. According to an article in a recent issue of the Cologne Gazette, the expenses of maintaining a family of four persons totals 240 marks a week, or 12,480 a year.
