DAIRYMEN OPEN SESSION TODAY

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 21.—The annual meeting of the Oregon Dairymen's league will be held at Eugene today and tomorrow.

The first day's program will feature an address of welcome by C. D. Rorer, president Bank of Commerce, Eugene, followed by the president's annual address, "A. E. Westcott, Banks. "Can Dairymen Co-operate?" will be the subject of an address by Alma D. Katz, president of the Oregon Dairymen's league. This will be discussed by such leading dairy authorities as J. D. Mickle, state dairy and food commissioner, M. S. Schrock and R. C. Denny.

"Teaching the Public What It Ought to Know," by Mr. Mickle, and "Why Milk," by E. C. Calloway, have been scheduled for the first day.

The business session will be held the second day. "Selecting a Foundation Herd," by E. A. Rhoten, "Feeding for Milk," Farmer Smith, "How to Develop a World Record Heifer," by J. I. VanKleeck, "How the Dairymen Can Utilize his Experience," by Ira P. Whitney, and "Control of Abortion and Sterility," by Dr. B. T. Simms, O. A. C., are other leading addresses.

The luncheon Thursday will be under the auspices of the Eugene chamber of commerce, which insures a jolly-up as well as good eats, according to Prof. P. M. Brandt, dairy chief at O. A. C., the secretary-treasurer.
