**DIVORCE SUIT TRIED.**

The divorce suit of J. W. Swartzwager against Retta Swartzwager was tried in the circuit court yesterday. Decision is pending the preparation of the transcript by the reporter.

**RANCHER SUES POWER CONCERN**

Asserting that after he had gone to great expense in preparation for receiving electric service from the Keno Power company, the company has failed to fulfill its contract for delivery, Edward Sutton, rancher on the Klamath river a few miles below town, yesterday instituted a damage suit for \$2500 in the circuit court. Plaintiff alleges that he is the owner of 240 acres of land susceptible to irrigation by pumping, and that defendant contracted to furnish electric power to operate his pumping plants and current to light his house and buildings, not to exceed 10 horsepower, delivery to begin May 15, 1918.

Relying on this contract, he says, he went to much expense in digging ditches, planning pumping sites, wiring his house and other buildings, and otherwise preparing to use the electrical service. He alleges that the defendant company knew of his work and his plans but when the time came for defendant to build connecting lines for delivery of the promised service it failed to do so, causing him great injury and loss.
