BOXERS READY FOR SOUND OF GONG TONIGHT

With everything in readiness for the latest show of the Klamath Falls Municipal Boxing Commission, fans and boxers alike are eagerly awaiting the gong for the curtain raiser at the Houston Opera house tonight.

Young Papke, the pride of Sacramento, arrived from the south last night looking fit as a fiddle and claiming that it will never be necessary for his contest to go six rounds. With his arrival all eight of tonight's fighters are in town and it would be hard to find better specimens of physical manhood.

After a crowd of fans had watched George Fiddler go through a workout yesterday they decided that tonight's bout will be a hot one. Both he and Huff have the reputation of getting their man in the early

rounds and both are known as rough and ready fighters. Huff is out to keep his name as king bee of this section of the country, while Fiddler has his eye on the coast title. Local sentiment is about equally divided with the upper end of the county backing Huff and the lower end and outsiders taking Fiddler.

Of scarcely less interest will be the semi-final between Young Papke of Sacramento and Bud Stevens of Portland. They are both fast snappy lightweights and the commission is congratulating itself on having a referee who is a good judge of points.

For the curtain raiser Toughy Wilson and the Chloquin Bearcat will go four rounds. Their last fight was a draw and both have been trying to prevail on the commission to let them go six rounds or more in order to get a final decision as to their prowess.

Ern Grafton and Young Fonville are local boys who are well known to the fans in this section. Each has a large circle of backers and each one on his toes to win in order to get in the main bout class.

It is believed that the opera house will be taxed to its limit tonight as this bids fair to be the biggest show ever staged in Klamath county. The Commission has spared no expense in bringing in representative fighters from up and down the coast and promise to make this city the talk of boxers and their promoters in every center east of the Rockies if the fans turn out and do their share. As a special section of the house is being reserved for the fair fans who do not wish ringside seats a goodly lot of ladies is expected.

O. A. C. BIDDIES SET NEW RECORD

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 23.—A dozen hens at the Oregon Agricultural College's farm at Salem, Ore., have set a new world record for egg production. James S. Dryden, professor at the college, has announced.

Each of these hens in one year laid more than 300 eggs, the best producing 330 and two others 323.

All these hens, according to Professor Dryden, are of the strain that several years ago developed Lady McDuff, the first hen to have laid more than 300 eggs a year in a trap nest. Her record was 303.

YANKEE TROOPS CLASH WITH RUSSIAN FORCES.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—As the result of a clash between detachments of American soldiers and Semenovoff soldiers January 10, near Polesakpia in General, six officers and 48 men of the Russian forces were captured and are still held. Major General Graves has advised the war department. He said the attack was entirely unprovoked. Two Americans were killed and one severely wounded. Five Russians were killed and one wounded.
