STATE CROPS BIG IN 1919

Throughout the state there has been a marked increase in products of all kinds.

Oregon's 1919 farm and orchard production crowds the half billion mark, with grain the largest item, over \$75,000,000.

The fruit production total is around \$45,000,000. Apples are leading in this field with nearly \$12,000,000 valuation. The dairy and dairy products returns total over \$35,000,000. The livestock output exceeds \$100,000,000, with cattle leading at \$32,000,000.

Vegetables of all kinds produced in Oregon totaled a valuation of \$50,000,000, with potatoes the most valuable crop, valued at \$15,000,000.

Poultry and eggs totaled \$75,000,000.

The salmon pack of over 75,000,000 pounds netted \$8,300,000.

Other products are estimated as follows: Wool, \$10,000,000; hops, \$2,000,000; honey, \$600,000.

Some comparisons with pre-war production show that in 1914 the total grain value was \$45,500,000, the total dairy production less than \$18,000,000; the total fruit production \$6,410,000; the total livestock output \$108,000,000, the total of vegetables \$19,000,000, and the remaining items of miscellaneous products \$59,000,000.

The production of Oregon farms grew from 1914, when it stood at \$266,000,000, to 1919 approximate total of \$437,000,000.
