## FARM BUREAU TO BRING IN PURE BLOODED STOCK

L. A. West, county chairman of the Farm Bureau committee on pure bred livestock, states that the committee is making definite arrangements to bring in a car load of registered shorthorn cattle to be sold at public auction the latter part of March. This will be making a big step forward in the livestock interests of Klamath county. It will be remembered that on the occasion of the farmers' auto tour last August, Professor Potter, who is at the head of the Animal Husbandry department of the Agricultural college, stated that Klamath county offered some of the best possibilities in the state for the raising of pure bred livestock. A part of the Farm Bureau plan with regard to this project is the establishing of an annual sale of pure bred stock in Klamath county. This will give those who raise pure bred animals an opportunity to put them into a breeder's sale. These combination country breeders' sales are becoming more popular each year and are drawing good crowds of men who are willing to pay good prices for choice animals.

Mr. West, also states, that this committee is backing the Boys' and Girls' pure bred calf club movement and expect to bring in 25 registered calves for that work. The club members will raise these calves, exhibit them at the county fair, and place them in a public auction the following spring. If any club member desires to purchase this calf back at the time of the auction, he has the right to bid the same as anyone. The committee wishes to get in touch, as soon as possible, with all who are interested in this movement for the bringing into Klamath county of some registered cattle. If you are interested in this movement get in touch with the nearest member of the committee or write to the County Farm Bureau office at Klamath Falls. The committee consists of the following men: L. A. West, county chairman; M. T. Prince, J. M. Ezell, U. E. Reed, Grant Nelson, Fred McKendree, Tom Patterson and A. L. Marshall.

The legislature decided, however, that no tuition should be charged in addition to the fees as now charged, and that there should be no special tuition fee for non-resident students. The legislature, there, provided for a little less than seven tenths of a mill which would bring to the college on present valuation of taxable property about \$685,000 annually to cover maintenance and the cost of additional building and equipment.

In order that the present emergency might be met and additional buildings constructed as soon as possible to relieve the congestion through the institution, the bill contains a provision which will make available the amount appropriated beginning with the present year. Should this measure be approved by the people at the May election money will be available therefore for construction work during the summer, and it should be possible to have some new buildings ready for occupancy when college opens in September.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 26.—The college is now looking to the people of Oregon to give relief to the present critical financial condition brought about through the doubling of the student enrollment, and the increased cost of maintenance in every department. The state legislature has made it possible for the people to pass on the future of the institution at the general election, May 21.

It has been estimated that at least six-tenths of one mill in addition to the present income would be required,—this in addition to a contemplated income from a tuition and other fees that might be received from stu-
