FLORENCE, Italy, Jan. 26.—During a meeting today at which the anarchist, Enrico Maltatesta, recently elected to the chamber of deputies, urged revolutionary measures, a mob tried to overcome a party of carabinieri. The latter, defending themselves, fired at the demonstrators wounding a score.

SEATTLE, Jan. 26.—John F. Blaine was arraigned today and given two weeks to plead to the indictment charging that he accepted a secret commission in connection with shipbuilding contracts. The grand jury will not consider any more shipyard cases for two weeks.
