SMUGGLERS ACTIVE ON GERMAN BORDER

KATTOWITZ, Upper Silesia, Jan. 3.—There is a hole or gap in the eastern customs border of Germany as well as in the west and thru both it is charged articles of luxury and German money are flowing. Illegal traders from Poland slip thru the German lines every day and return to Poland with whatever they can purchase in the way of shoes, clothes, textiles, sugar and food, much of which Germany wants to retain for her own use but which also are greatly desired in Poland.

There is no border and no hindrance of this trade. It is alleged that the goods thus shipped from Germany into Poland has run up into millions of marks.

MERCHANT SURVIVES TERRIBLE EXPERIENCE

NOGALES, Ariz., Jan. 27.—One of the most remarkable cases handled by local surgeons in recent years is that of Pedro Jamit, a Syrian merchant of Tuzpan, Nayarit, Mexico. A bullet that had been lodged in Jamit's back for several months was removed recently at a hospital here.

Jamit was held up and robbed of \$1,800 by bandits. He was shot thru the head, in the hip and in the stomach. The first two bullets came out of their own accord, while the one that entered the stomach was removed by the surgeons.

After being wounded, Jamit was taken into the mountains by the bandits. During the 16-days that he remained there, he received no medical treatment, his wounds being washed with cold water by an aged Mexican nurse. Through the aid of a Mexican woman, the Syrian escaped and made his way to the border.

Last year Jamit was robbed of \$5,000 by bandits.

PERSONNEL OF DANCING GROUP

On Thursday evening this city will be treated to a hitherto unknown entertainment. Dancing as a high art, where beauty of form and grace of movement all serve to interpret the emotions suggested by music, is new and is just beginning to be appreciated in this country. Only three groups of dancers now in the United States are capable of furnishing an entertainment on such a high plane and these are the Ruth St. Denis Dancers, Isadora Duncan group and the Russian Ballet. The Ruth St. Denis Dancers are unique and hold perhaps the highest place.

The personnel of the Dancers who will appear Thursday evening is unusually interesting. Doris Humphrey and Claire Niles are the two most experienced and expert dancers, both having been for several seasons on tour with Miss St. Denis. Ruth Austin is a splendid dancer and has just returned from a tour of Honolulu and the Islands. Julianne Johnston, who has made quite a reputation in pictures, is a clever dancer and a well known photographer's model. Genevieve Stevens has been with Miss St. Denis for a thirty weeks' tour and Katharine Hawley, formerly with Isadora Duncan, came from New York last Spring. Grace Carson and Virginia Bell, native daughters of California, have recently joined the St. Denis forces.

The baby, Betty May, has been with Miss St. Denis, at her school at Denishawn for the past three years and is only excused from school for a short tour.

Pauline Lawrence, the young pianist has been trained at Denishawn by Mr. Shawn and Miss St. Denis, as a Dance pianist. She is a pianist of great power and brilliancy.

Lovers of fine music, on Thursday night will be treated to a thoroughly fine programme which of itself would be worth the price and admission but, added to this will be the hitherto unknown element. The Dancers are all beautiful refined young women and the themes of the composers will be translated by them into the poetry of motion. This is known as "Music Visualization."

The form of entertainment given by these few exponents of dancing everywhere attracts much attention and overflowing houses. Klamath Falls is particularly fortunate to be considered at all in the itinerary of the Ruth St. Denis Dancers as only large centers are served and but few places in Oregon will have the privilege of seeing them on this tour.
