NOGALES, Ariz., Jan. 27 .- One of the most remarkable cases handled by local surgeons in recent years is that of Pedro Jamit, a Syrian merchant of Tuzpan, Nayarit, Mexico. A bullet that had been lodged in Jamit's back for several months was removed recently at a hospital here.

Jamit was held up and robbed of the head, in the hip and in the stomach. The first two bullets came out of their own accord, while the one that entered the stomach was removed by the surgeons.

After being wounded, Jamit was taken into the mountains by the bandits. During the 16-days that he remained there, he received no medica" treatment, his wounds being washed with cold water by an aged Mexican nurse. Through the aid of a Mexican woman, the Syrian escaped and made his way to the border.

Last year Jamit was robbed of \$5,-000 by bandits.
