## CANADA GRANTS SHIPYARD SUBSIDY

SEATTLE, Wash. Jan. 29.—Canada's federal government, in order to keep the British Columbia shipbuilding industry alive, has decided to make loans to all yards needing assistance up to seventy five per cent of the cost of the ships on the ways, according to reports received in ship-building circles here.  
One Victoria, B. C. plant, operated by the Cholberg Company, will be one of the first private corporations to receive government aid. The Cholberg yard plans to build four wooden sailing schooners with money borrowed mainly from the government. The government will finance the ships up to \$175,000 per ship on the understanding that the company furnishes \$75,000. Each vessel will cost about \$250,000.

## WILL SALVAGE TRUCKS.

LONDON, Jan. 3. (By Mail).—Large numbers of derelict army trucks now rusting where they were abandoned in shell-swept areas in France are to be "rescued" and brought back to England by the Ministry of Transport.

## 200 L. A. GIRLS MISSING, 1919

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 29.—Two hundred and twenty-eight girls disappeared in Los Angeles in 1919, according to records of the police department, just made public. Officers believe some will be found but that the majority never will be. This belief has crystallized in an effort to establish here a Bureau of Missing Girls, with a number of policewomen detailed to do nothing but search for the missing.  
Leo Marden, police sergeant, who prepared the report, said nine out of ten of the missing girls were of the "butterfly" or "rattlebrained" type, "crazy for the attention of men."  
Judge Sidney Reeve, of the juvenile court, said many girls ran away from home because of lack of parental control. He said:  
"The modern home seems to be lax in the control of children. The good old days when girls were not allowed out without a chaperone seem to be gone. Parents of today are so engrossed in the rush of modern life they have not the time nor the inclination to provide the proper home entertainment for their children. And the result? They do not realize their mistake until a daughter disappears, perhaps never to be found."  
Sergeant Marden added:  
"The motion pictures lure many girls from home. The girls seem to resent parental discipline and long for the glow and glamour of a film star. The film to克斯 are working with us in preventing this evil and many a director has notified us of a runaway girl. Sometimes we get them before it is too late. Sometimes not."  
Sergeant Marden said many of the girls were traced to Tijuana and Mexicali, Lower California border towns, where they were in "white slavery," but few would return, because of dread of disgrace.

## SAILORS PROTEST.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 29.—Sailors from Australia arriving in Vancouver and Seattle, are protesting against the sharp differences in exchange which has reduced the purchasing value of the British pound on this side of the world.  
Information received in local marine circles, indicates that Australian cash has been the basis of pay on which sailors were signed at Sydney for trips to Seattle, San Francisco and Vancouver. The sailors figured their "16 ounces." The rate on sterling here has been \$4.13 and it has been about \$3.78 at Seattle.

## BRITON WILL FLY ACROSS PACIFIC

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 28.—Major D. A. Yarnold, of the Royal Flying Corps who was in Vancouver recently, is today enroute to England, to obtain permission to attempt to fly across the Pacific ocean. If the formal approval is obtained, Major Yarnold intends to proceed to Weybridge to superintend the construction of the machine he hopes to pilot from San Francisco to Australia.  
Major Yarnold is listed among the British aces. Thirty-two German airplanes and eight sausage balloons are officially recorded to his credit. He wears several decorations and was thrice wounded in action.  
The flight between San Francisco and Honolulu, is the most difficult part of the jaunt to Australia, in Major Yarnold's opinion. The total distance is estimated at 6575 miles. From Sydney, Australia, to the Fiji Islands is about 1748 miles; from Fiji to Honolulu is 2736 miles and from Honolulu to San Francisco is 2059 miles.

## BOX OUTPUT WILL BE SHORT

PORTLAND, Jan. 29.—Fruit growers and cannery companies, that use supplies of boxes in which to ship their products should order their boxes at once in order to insure having them. Such was the warning sounded at a meeting of 40 box manufacturers and lumbermen from the five states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and California and from British Columbia.  
Owing to the unusual demand for lumber at this time, particularly from the east and owing to the lack of old stock in the yards, box manufacture has not been given the attention usually accorded it by lumber manufacturers, it was brought out, and much small timber that hitherto has been useful for little else than box lumber has been sold for the building industry. In the face of this condition lumbermen and box manufacturers express fear that unless growers and cannery order their boxes early they will be unable to get them at the end of the season, the timber having been sold out to the building industry in this section and in the east.

The session was the first for the box manufacturers, having been called by George M. Cornwall, editor of the Timberman, Portland. The mill capacity for cutting up lumber into box sizes along the Pacific coast is given at 6,000,000 feet per day, and nearly every mill of large size engaged in the business had a representative present. Mr. Cornwall called the meeting to order, and introduced E. E. Young of Fresno, Cal., manager of the lumber department of the California Peach Growers' association of California, who presided.  
The matter of standardization of boxes was discussed at some length, but the only action taken was a resolution urging that during the present shortage it be left to the option of the manufacturer whether one or two piece ends, one or two-piece sides and packing cases for canned goods. The system in vogue in California whereby each box manufacturer is guided by a uniform table in determining the lumber footage in boxes, instead of each man determining the footage on his own basis, was discussed, but no action was taken. A committee to consider this matter further was named consisting of J. P. Keating, E. D. Rowley and George M. Cornwall of Portland, W. C. Cram of Raymond, C. M. Crego of Spokane and George E. Chafee of Vancouver, B. C.
