ONTARIO, Cal. Feb. 2.—Mrs. Susie R. Mills, of this city, is believed to have established a precedent in advertising.

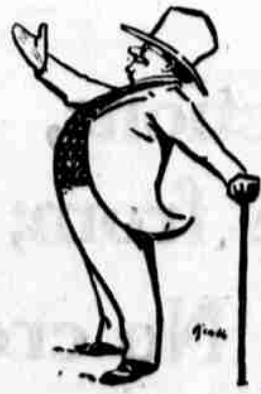
Mrs. Mills purchase newspaper space here to tell the world her home "was not for sale."

**\$1200 PROFIT  
FROM 425 HENS**

A flock of 425 "Oregons" laid last year for the poor of Multnomah county farm 70,176 eggs, valued at \$2,500. Not only did the hens supply strictly fresh eggs for the inmates of the county institution, but they provided employment for some of the county wards which meant a little zest in their otherwise monotonous life.

Under the supervision of the farm foreman, U. G. Smith, the inmates did practically all the work in feeding and caring for the flock.

The pullets were hatched and grown at the poultry department of the Oregon Agricultural college. Every two years, for the last five years, pullets have been supplied by the college. They are kept for two years, except the poor layers, which are culled out each summer.

The flock has been laying well and it has not been necessary to cull many. Though it does not get what would be called expert care, the record of 165 eggs a hen in the second year of laying was much better than first year performances of the average flock of pullets.

After paying for the feed, there was a profit left of about \$1,200.

A modern poultry house was built three years ago from plans drawn by the college station poultry department. It is 100 feet long and 16 feet wide, of the open-front type, and has a capacity of 500 hens.

**LAND CLEARING  
MADE CHEAPER**

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Feb. 3.—The new Oregon land clearing methods will be demonstrated in several county agent counties of Oregon this year. It is says H. D. Sessler, head of farm management at O. A. C., the simplest, cheapest and most practical method yet devised.

"The new method is a modified char-pitting process, in which the use of a simple contrivance thoroughly fires the stump, which is then consumed in the char pit," says Professor Sessler. "The failure of the char-pitting plan was because beginners have failed to fire the stump completely. Thorough firing is assured by the new method, and thus makes the char pit successful even with beginners."

Costs of clearing have been proved by actual records to have been cut from \$100 to not more than \$50 per acre, by use of the Oregon system. Another advantage of its use is the better condition in which the land is left for farming.

**LEAGUE OF NATIONS  
IS ELECTION ISSUE**

GALLATIN, Mo., Feb. 3.—The League of Nations probably will be made an issue in the special congressional election to be held February 14 to fill the vacancy caused by the appointment of Joshua W. Alexander, former representative in Congress from this district, to the portfolio of Secretary of Commerce. Although no official announcement has been made by many of the candidates, Democrat politicians who are in touch with the situation, declare that the league will unquestionably be made an issue.

The principal contestants for the Democratic nomination are Charles E. Yancy, a wealthy stockman of Liberty, Mo., and Captain J. L. Milligan of Richmond.

The Republican aspirants are Frank B. Klepper, prosecuting attorney of Clinton County, and John E. Frost of Plattsburg. Klepper was elected to Congress from the district fourteen years ago and served one term. Frost was defeated at the last election in 1918 by 1,795 votes, a small plurality for the district, which is normally strongly Democratic.

Republican leaders profess to see hope for a victory for them in the factional struggle within the Democratic party in the district, recent intensified by the killing of Wesley L. Robertson, editor of The Gallatin Democrat, by Hugh Y. Tarwater, city clerk of Gallatin.

**"MISS SPOKANE" IS  
GOING TO MARRY**

SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 3.—With the forthcoming marriage of Miss Marguerite Motie there will pass into history the character of "Miss Spokane", who for eight years has typified, personally and in a hundred other ways, the spirit of this community.

In March, 1912, Miss Motie was chosen from some 150 other young women of this city and environs as the best representative of the Indian princess created by Miss Eleanor Gadols in an artists' competition to select a "trade mark" for the city.

Since that time, Miss Motie, as "Miss Spokane," clad in her fringed dress and legions of buckskin, with buckskin moccasins, has represented this city personally at many conventions, fairs and celebrations here and in other states, and her picture had been reproduced literally hundreds of thousands of times in advertising and publicity matter, and has been adopted by a number of business firms as their trade mark.
