BITER ON CON GAME BITTEN

VIENNA, Jan. 15.—(By Mail)—A Vienna money broker was robbed of 2,000,000 rubles the other day in a political plot to obtain control of the Ukrainian legation here. The story as worked out by the police is as good as a play.

The scheme was the familiar confidence game of inducing the broker to violate the law and of seizure of the money by criminals disguised as gendarmes.

A supposed Ukrainian general recently arrived in Vienna and engaged with a money broker to buy up to 2,000,000 rubles. It is illegal in Austria to deal in foreign money or to have it in private possession, and all foreign exchange is done through authorized banks. The broker agreed to have the amount in hand on a certain day. He lived and conducted his business in a hotel.

On the appointed afternoon, but a little ahead of time, a man in the uniform of a Ukrainian colonel called on the broker and, saluting, said he had come for General X's money. They sat down to a table to check the money, when the door was opened and two gendarmes walked in and placed both under arrest on the charge of possessing and dealing in foreign money.

The broker begged and protested and finally was told to appear in court on the following day, his record being taken with the greatest care and particulars. But the colonel's protests were unavailing. He stormed and invoked his nationality in vain. The two policemen gathered up the money, counted it, and giving a receipt, told the broker to appear promptly before the authorities.

Then, taking the colonel, they left. An hour later the broker woke up to the fact that the colonel and the two gendarmes were fakers and he had been robbed of some 2,000,000 rubles.

The Vienna police are efficient in this kind of thing and in a day or two had gathered in two of the swindlers, but not the one with the money. Working on the case they finally ascertained that the money was to be used for political ends.

The plan, according to the police reports, was a plot to seize the Ukrainian legation here by an opposing political faction, get possession of the records and seals and defy the existing government, a plot characteristic of the present unsettled state of affairs in eastern Europe. The legation, however, had wind of it and was prepared for whatever might happen. The police say this is the second plot to the same end frustrated.

VOLCANO'S FLOW IS SPECTACULAR

HILO, ISLAND OF HAWAII, Jan. 10. (By Mail).—Kilauea Volcano, which during the closing month of 1919 produced an eruption surpassing anything of its kind in recent years, opened 1920 with another magnificent spectacle which had not been paralleled since 1868.

On December 22, lava from Kilauea forced its way up through the floor of the Kau desert, six miles distant from the firepit of the crater, and by New Year's Day observers were watching a flow of molten lava, six miles long and 100 yards wide, traveling southward through the forest of ohia trees at a rate of three miles per day. An inner travel of the flow was making as high speed as twelve miles an hour at the source, and welling from springs twelve feet across.

As the molten lava cut into the forest the trees were set afire, many of them being quickly burned through at their bases and carried along upright in the flow like ranks of giant torches.

The location of Kilauea's most recent outbreak is along the rift line of 1868, left by the terrific earthquakes which rocked the island of Hawaii in that year. The rift, clearly defiled, runs from the southern rim of Halemauau, the "house of fire," or firepit of Kilauea, through the south wall of the main crater and thence to the sea, twenty miles away in a series of wide, parallel crevasses. The new flow, however, has not made its appearance along the rift at a point closer to the firepit than six miles, where it has welled up through the thickly lava-coated desert floor of Kau.

From the rift line many molten thirty feet in the air. Heavy fumes were emanating from the earth along the entire line of the rift.

Kilauea's latest outbreak is the culmination of a long period of tremendous activity, caused, say the volcano observers, by underground pressure of lava which was not relieved by the recent discharges from the crater proper.

As the desert flow increased, the tinned to sink, until volcanologists prophesied that the pit might be drained.
