RUSS COSSACKS TO HOLD CONVENTION

BERLIN, Jan. 21. (By Mail).—An all-Russian Congress of Cossacks to be held in Moscow beginning February 15 is announced in a wireless message from Moscow. The form established for the elections provides for one delegate from every Cossack regiment, or individual military section, one delegate from each Cossack village with less than 5,000 inhabitants, and two delegates from each village with more than 5,000 residents. The subjects to be discussed include: The political position of Soviet Russia, the establishment of the Soviet regime in Cossack territory, and the elections to the Cossack section of the All-Russian Soviet.

Farm Bureau Items

The Potato meeting and sorting demonstration held at the Farmers' Warehouse, Thursday, was attended by about 25 farmers interested in growing potatoes. Considerable interest is again being shown in the possibilities of potato growing in Klamath County on a commercial scale. C. A. Hill, Farm Bureau Committee-man on Potato production from the Mt. Laki district, arranged for the meeting and demonstration. A committee was appointed at this meeting, consisting of C. A. Hill, Henry Seamon and Bruce Gaddis, for the purpose of formulating plans for a permanent potato growers organization. County Agent Thomas has been asked to get in communication with other districts where potato growers organizations are in successful operation and have details of these plans ready for this committee to consider. The committee will meet in the County Agents office, Monday, February 16th.

Through the Farm Bureau office, the Committee pushing the silo campaign, had a questionnaire sent out to a number of Counties where sunflowers are grown. Some very interesting reports are now being received. The following is taken from a report from the County Agent of Wallowa county.

"J. P. Gillespie of Lostine started the feeding season with forty pounds of alfalfa hay and seven pounds of mill feed for each of his twelve dairy cows. About November 15th, he opened his silo and stopped feeding grain. The cows started off eating sunflowers silage at the rate of twenty pounds per day. They ate only twenty pounds of alfalfa in addition and increased one quart per day in milk flow. The first ration cost Mr. Gillespie 75 cents per day but the sunflower, hay ration cost him only forty cents per day even if we figure two tons of silage the same price as one ton of hay. Mr. Gillespie is feeding forty pounds per day per cow at this time and his cream check was never so good as now. He is also feeding his ewes on 2 1-2 pounds per day and says he is saving much hay with them. No ill results have been obtained by Mr. Gillespie and he reports his stock in better condition for silage another year. He says "I would like to see a silo on every farm in Wallowa County. I have kept my cost of production down with silage and my cream check for November, December, and January from twelve head amounted to \$712."

CLASSIFY FOREST LANDS IN MONTANA AREA.

MISSOULA, Mont. Feb. 7.—Classification of agricultural lands within the forests, as provided in congressional legislation of 1912, has been completed in this district No. 1, and shows that the total area of the district is 26,645,848 acres. Of this area, 4,164,668 acres are alienated, leaving a net area of 22,482,180 acres of national forest land. The work of classification, an enormous task covering a period of eight years, was done under the direct supervision of C. B. Swin, assistant at the district headquarters in the department of land classification.

Of the net area, 22,122,987, acres were permanently classified and segregated as being unsuited for agricultural purposes. Left for intensive classification were 359,193 acres which were covered in the final survey. Of this total, 42,275, acres were listed for agriculture. The remaining acreage was classified for forestry purposes.

GERMAN CHEMISTS DOUBLE CAPITAL

BERLIN, Jan. 21. (By Mail).—The aniline organization, comprising most of the leading German chemical factories, has doubled its capital stock, making the total 600,000,000 marks, in order to build new factories for the production of nitrocellulose fertilizers. It is considered highly probable that Germany will soon be able to export instead of import chemical fertilizers.
