Be it resolved by the City of Klamath Falls that the grades of portions of said streets be changed as follows:

- 57 ft. from southerly line of Grant—Elevation 258.50; then steps, 3-16 inch risers, 2-18 inch tread.
- 65 ft. from southerly line of Grant—Elevation 263.50; then steps, 15-6 inch risers, 14-15 inch tread.

## KILL WEEDS WITH STEAM APPARATUS.

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Feb. 11.—Apparatus to kill weeds with superheated steam, the invention of two Texas railroad men, is nearing completion in San Bernardino shops. It is designed to keep railroad tracks free from vegetable growth.

The apparatus consists of a flat car equipped with flexible pipes, pierced with one-eighth inch holes. Curtains hold the steam in at the sides when the pipes are lowered to the track level and superheated steam from a specially equipped engine is turned on. The steam kills the weeds and any pollen which may be scattered about.

## CURRENCY INFLATION ENORMOUS, CLAIM

Congressman Ince of Massachusetts has sounded a warning to his colleagues and the country that unless further inflation of the currency is prevented nothing can avert a financial disaster. He claims that there is in circulation at the present time more than two billion dollars of paper money based solely on credit. As the basis for his assertion he points to

the daily balance sheet issued by the Treasury. Recently that sheet showed outstanding Federal notes to the amount of \$3,143,137,948, "against which there is in gold and lawful money \$1,126,261,000." Mr. Luce subtracts one figure from the other and reaches his conclusions as to the enormous amount of money which has behind it nothing but the credit of the Government. The Congressman ridicules the idea that the cost

of living can be lowered by prosecuting profiteers. "If a man is attacked with appendicitis," says he "he should not devote his energies to catching flies." The real remedy, in the opinion of Mr. Luce, is in the stimulation of production in every industry, and the practice of the most rigid economy on the part of the Government and individuals.
