FRENCH START GLASSWARE PLANTS

LONDON, Jan. 23. (By Mail).—Glassware production on a huge scale by American machinery is to be undertaken by a combine which has just absorbed half a dozen big glass-making concerns in the industrial center of England known as the "Black Country."

At Stourbridge, Dudley and Tipton new factories will be built where American patents for turning out the cheaper class of glass-blown goods will be utilized. Before the war, this kind of trade was virtually a monopoly of Germany and Austria, and the crippling of the latter's industries has caused the prices of the commonest glass household articles in England to soar tremendously.

HUFF PUTS OUT NAVAL SCRAPPER

Showing the effects of a month's continual training, Billy Huff, local middleweight, fought a clever battle against a hard opponent at the opera house last night, winning over Sailor Bosco with a knockout in the fourth round. Bosco was game and went to the mat twice and rose again in the final round to take more punishment. Huff's terrific fight quickly brought about his third fall and he stayed down for the count.

Bosco started from the gong with a series of rushes, and had some of his blows connected. It would have been curtains for Huff. The local fighter ducked, blocked and dodged the onrush with the cool strategy of a veteran, however, and the wild attack proved a boomerang for the sailor. Huff maneuvered into position to deliver several telling blows and the first round closed with all the advantage on his side.

The second round was marked by an interchange of solid blows, with no perceptible advantage, but in the third Huff began to show an ascendancy, driving his opponent against the ropes and landing one blow that brought Bosco to his knees. The sailor was sore and shaken when he retired to his corner, and when he came back for the fourth round he received a terrific pummeling that quickly brought him to final disaster.

Huff had the old time wallop in his right that seemed lacking when he fought Fiddler last month. His swings were terrific and there was a trip hammer effect to short arm punches that showed a world of steam behind them. His defense has apparently improved and all round he appeared a much more formidable antagonist than when he fought Fiddler last month.

Young Papke of Sacramento got a decision over Mickey Brown of San Francisco after eight rounds of hard fighting. Papke had Brown bested from the fourth round, and all that saved the San Francisco fighter from a knockout was lack of steam behind Papke's punches thereafter.

This was due to a dislocated knuckle Papke received in the fourth round. His hand has been tender since his fight with Sailor Suddington at Sacramento a year ago and he favored it perceptibly from the first bell. In the fourth round the joint went out, saving Brown from a knockout. As it was Papke landed consistently on the San Franciscan for the four remaining rounds but seemingly could not muster steam for a knockout. Brown was perilously near the mat in the seventh and the final gong narrowly averted a knockout.

D. 1920, present their petition to said Council praying for the vacation of certain streets and alleys in Klamath Addition to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, described as follows, to-wit:

All that portion of Fourth Street lying and being between blocks 111 and 112 in said addition;

All that portion of Second Street lying and being alongside and adjacent to lot 8, in block 100, and to blocks 101, 109 and 110 in said addition;

All that portion of Willow Avenue lying and being between blocks 100 and 101 in said addition;

All that portion of the alley running through blocks 101 and 102 in said addition;

All that portion of Elm Avenue lying and being between blocks 101 and 109 and blocks 102 and 103 in said addition;

All that portion of the alley running through blocks 103 and 108 in said addition;
