### WILL NOT YIELD TO EXTRADITION.

BERLIN, Feb. 13.—The committee of Foreign relations of the national assembly today decided to support the Government's stand in declaring that the "Ethical and Patriotic indignation of the people at the Allied demand for the extradition of Germans in such that the carrying out of the extradition measures has been made practically impossible and would produce internal insurrection. The government decided to turn over the list to the Attorney General who will investigate the crimes charged and see if they can be prosecuted under the German Law.

## RIO GRANDE BELIES NAME

EL PASO, Tex., Feb. 13.—Despite its name, the Rio Grande is not a "big river." The stream that divides Anglo-Saxon America from Latin-America is a "mighty, turbulent flood" only in song and story.

Especially since the construction of the Elephant Butte Dam, in New Mexico, about 100 miles north of El Paso. This dam, which is the largest in the United States, with a capacity of 2,600,000 acre feet, has deflected as much as 1,138,000 acre feet of the river's waters at one time. This water has been kept in storage in the dam by the United States Reclamation service, to be used in the irrigation of the lands constituting the Rio Grande project, which extends from San Marcial, New Mexico, to a point 50 miles southeast of here.

North of San Marcial, the maximum flood depth of the river is about six feet. South of this point, for several hundred miles down the river, its average depth is not much more than three feet.

At El Paso, where the bed of the river is narrow and where as a consequence the channel ought to be deeper, the depth of the river is scarcely ever over three feet. The following figures are taken from the records of the Reclamation Service records:

In January, 1919, the average depth was 1 foot; in February, 1 and 2 feet; March, 2 feet; April, 2 to 3 feet; May 2 to 3 feet; June 2 1-2 feet; July, 2 to 3 feet; August, 2 feet to 3 feet; September, 2 to 3 feet; October, 1 to 2 feet; November, 1 to 2 feet; December, 1 foot. Had it not been for the water deflected by the Elephant Butte dam, the average depth of the water at El Paso would have been between 8 to 9 feet, reclamation officials estimated. The width of the river at El Paso is about 150 feet.

The Rio Grande, however, has been on a few rampages in the past. About six miles north of El Paso, there are still standing houses the brick wall of which distinctly show a "water line" about six feet above the floor level. Such a water line in the open spaces where the houses are situated would mean a depth of probably 12 feet in the narrows at El Paso. During the Texas floods in September, 1919, a depth of from 50 to 60 feet is said to have been reached by the Rio Grande in certain narrow portions of its bed.

## FIGHT ASTORS' PEERAGE CLAIM

LONDON, Jan. 23. (By Mail).—If Lord Astor is sincere in his desire to rid himself of his peerage, says the current Saturday Review, let him find the bagatelle of 4,000 pounds or 5,000 "to pay the expenses of an informer who shall sue him for penalties for voting illegally in the House of Lords. Or, as the peers very seldom vote, let Lord Astor put up the money for a similar action against Lady Astor for voting in the House of Commons."

"For," continues the Saturday Review, "Lord and Lady Astor stand or fall together. Either they are both qualified to sit in both Houses, or neither is qualified to sit in either. Both were born out of the kingdom, not of English parents, and their ability or disability to be peer and peeress depends on whether the Naturalization Act of 1870 did or did not repeal the disabling section in the Act of Settlement, passed in the reign of William III., which says that no person born out of the Kingdom or Dominions, except of English parents, can sit in either House of Parliament, or in the Privy Council.

"In the Speyer-Cassel case, five judges decided that the Act of 1870 repealed the clause in the Act of Settlement: but Lord Astor can afford to carry the case to the House of Lords.

"If Lord Astor can get the House of Lords to decide that the Act of 1870 did not repeal the disabling clause in the Act of Settlement, then he and his wife will be free as air: their titles and privileges will automatically fall from them, and restore them to their primitive American simplicity. Only, they will have to get a new act to enable them to sit in the House of Commons.

There is, indeed, another reason why we think that Lady Astor cannot sit in the House of Commons. She is a peeress, which is a legal status, sharing the privileges and disabilities of her husband.

### O. A. C. DOES MUCH EXTENSION WORK

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Feb. 13.—The college is serving the people of the state who cannot go to Corvallis for instructional work by conducting farmers' and home-makers' courses through the extension service. Such courses, which last for several days, have been arranged for February in Benton, Clackamas, Lincoln, Linn, Multnomah, Umatilla, Wallowa, and Washington counties.

Subjects to be discussed in the courses are soils, farm crops, dairying, horticulture, animal husbandry, poultry, silos and silage, farm tractors, and home-making. Opportunity for a practical study of general farming, livestock and home problems is thus afforded people who are unable to attend Farmers' week at the college or to take advantage of any of the short courses offered at Corvallis. Arrangements are being made for educational schools and short courses to be held in other sections of the state. Prof. E. B. Fitts, dairy specialist in the extension service, is in charge of the arrangements for these schools.
