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BUILDING NEW FOREST TRAIL

Under construction of a direct trail between Illabe, Oregon, on the Siskiyou National Forest, and Powers, Oregon, four miles north of the Forest boundary, the Forest Service will open a route between these two points which will reduce the traveling time one-half, and be passable for use the year round. The total distance covered is twenty-six miles.

The citizens of Powers and vicinity are co-operating in this trail project and as their part of the work have just finished building the trail bridge across the South Fork Coquille river near Rock Creek and about sixteen miles south of Powers. The bridge as completed is of the suspension type, built with one and a quarter inch cable and a 100-foot span, and cost in contributed labor and money one thousand dollars.

Work on the trail and bridge began at the same time last fall. The bridge has been finished all except painting, which will be done in the spring after the timbers have had an opportunity to season.

When the trail construction was stopped by snow there remained about three miles to build in order to open the whole route. The officers plan to finish this work as early in the spring as weather conditions will permit.

Arthur M. Fish of Powers was foreman of the bridge building crew. The trail construction is under the charge of Forest Ranger R. I. Helm, of Agness.

All told the Forest Service built 102 miles of new trails on the National Forests in Oregon during 1919.

JAPANESE WILL INCREASE NAVY

TOKIO, Jan. 19.—(By Mail).—The Japanese budget for the next fiscal year amounts to the equivalent of about \$637,972,011. An increase equivalent to about \$100,000,000 is asked by the army and navy.

The minister of finances has stated that it is highly important to strengthen the national defense in order that peace may be preserved and the mechanism of communication developed. Substantial increases are also called for in the departments of education and communication.

Referring to the naval expenditure, it was explained that, in the extraordinary expenditures of the navy, estimates have been included for the completion of the so-called "eight and eight squadron" (Eight dreadnoughts and eight battle cruisers). The proposed naval scheme will cost about \$375,975,000, of which \$40,000,000 appears in the budget for the coming year.

It is proposed to begin the construction of the following warships: Four battleships, four battle cruisers, twelve cruisers, thirty-seven destroyers, five gunboats, twelve special service ships, six mine sweepers, and some submarines.

The increased expenditure will be met principally by heavier income tax, which will advance over that of last year by approximately \$39,000,000. The tax on sake, the Japanese national drink, which is made from rice, also will be increased.

The shortage in the revenue will be made good by the temporary suspension of the redemption of the domestic national loan.

FIGHT DISEASE IN SHANGHAI

SHANGHAI, Jan. 15. (By Mail).—Shanghai has what is called a "Safety First Club," the single aim of which is to prevent the introduction of disease into foreign households thru servants. The organization is an outgrowth of activities of St. Luke's Hospital and it was formed to enable members, in return for fixed fees, to have their Chinese servants examined at the hospital periodically.

The need of such an institution in Shanghai is appreciated when it is remembered that the 20,000 or more

foreigners are domiciled in a city of more than 2,000,000 which has no sewers and in which none of the ordinary safeguards to preserve the public health exist. Wages are exceedingly low in comparison with Occidental standards, and range from \$6, Mexican, a month for the coolie house boy up to probably \$15, Mexican, a month for a cook. It is a modest establishment, that has not two or more native domestic workers.

Leprosy in advanced stages is to be met with in Shanghai's streets, particularly in the Chinese city, tuberculosis claims 15 per cent of the Chinese who die every year, trachoma is common, typhoid and para-typhoid are ever-present, the social diseases are most widespread.

The foreigner has sought to safeguard his health by following the

common practice of engaging his physician by the year, under contract, and by other means. Yet it is felt that the door of the foreign household has been left open to infection by ignoring the condition of servants who are recruited from all quarters of the community and who for the most part come from outside the limits of the international settlement that forms the heart of the city. It is to deal with this source of danger that the Safety First Club was formed.

FILM CENSORSHIP.

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 28. (By Mail).—A censorship of all moving picture films taken in Mexico has been instituted by the Department of the Interior which will not permit films deemed harmful to Mexico's interests to leave the country.
