ALASKA ASKS CONGRESS' AID

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 13.—Five big items are on a list of legislative enactments Alaska is going to ask of Congress, Governor Thomas Riggs, Jr., of Alaska said here recently when he passed through enroute to the national capital to present the northern territory's request to Washington.
 The five items are:
 Grant a bonus to gold miners, Alaskans claim that everything has gone up in price except gold, itself and prospectors will not search for the metal unless it will buy more for them.
 Pass the pending oil and coal leasing bill. Passage of the bill, it is claimed, will enable development of Alaska's oil fields.
 Open up the national forest reserves for pulp mills. Billions of feet of good pulp wood stand on Alaska's two big forest reserves. Pulp and paper men will not establish mills on the reserves, however, until laws are passed which would give them title to the land.
 Regulate the salmon fishing industry. Alaska's big industry, salmon fishing, is rapidly becoming a thing of the past and unless the fishing is conserved, the silver horde of the north will be gone within a few years, it is claimed.
 Establish a federal constabulary. Alaska wants a federal constabulary on the order of the state police of Pennsylvania. At present a few United States marshals have the big task of preserving peace in almost the entire northland.

JAPANESE PLAN TO COLONIZE THE ARGENTINE

BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 12.—(By Mail.)—Some Argentine newspapers are calling attention to what they regard as indications that the Japanese are preparing the way for an extensive colonization program in South America as well as seeking on this continent a larger market for their goods. The matter has attracted considerable attention in diplomatic and commercial circles.
 The treaty with Paraguay, which the Japanese minister to Chile crossed the continent to sign at Asuncion, gives Japan favored nation privileges including the right of colonization. Discussing this treaty, Paraguay's finance minister, Eusebio Ayala, said that one of the objects of Japan was to provide for colonization in his country. He added that Paraguay, which is a country the size of California, with only a million inhabitants, and a wonderful capacity for agricultural development, would welcome the Japanese. It is now reported that a similar treaty is being negotiated with Uruguay.
 In furtherance of this supposed colonization plan in South America, Japanese capitalists, according to the newspaper, La Razon, have recently acquired enormous tracts of agricultural lands in northern Peru and Bolivia.
 Those in Bolivia are said to be 1,800 miles square; those in Peru 20,000 miles square. It is also said that Japanese capitalists have invested recently in the exploitation of tin mines in Bolivia and the projection of railways which they are preparing to construct and operate.
 "There is no doubt," says La Razon, "that there already exists a vast plan of Japanese colonization in Peru and Bolivia, a plan which considering the very dispersed native population and their relative incapacity for certain kinds of work, is susceptible to very rapid development, and to such an extent that practically very soon Japan will count three large nuclei of interests in South America: Sao Paulo, in Brazil, where enormous quantities of coffee are produced and exported to the far east; the department of Tarija, in Bolivia, and the province of Loreto, in Peru."
 "It is also practically certain that in order to satisfy the needs of these colonization centers an active commercial interchange will be established, but the proportions of this economic expansion are not limited to this."
 "Japan, according to one of its most authorized newspapers, is thinking out a very ample commercial program and nobody ought to be surprised if within the next ten or twenty years its South American trade were far ahead of the majority of the other nations, as she is working for this unceasingly."
 "These initiatives and tendencies are worthy of consideration, as they constitute a new phase, perhaps the most interesting one for us, of the rivalry between the empire of the Rising Sun and the northern republic."
 The record of Japanese business activity in this part of South America includes the arrival here of a Japanese agricultural commercial mission a few months ago, which is co-operating with an active Japanese chamber of commerce in Buenos Aires.
 Japanese business men are arriving by many routes, including the Japanese steamship line. One of the most recent arrivals coming by the way of the United States is Shinjiro Ushikoshi, commercial expert of the Japanese department of commerce and export.
 He is making a six months' tour of South American countries to study consumption needs and also represents important Japanese financial interests desiring to invest capital in South America.

 That the boundaries of the said proposed irrigation district are as follows:
 Beginning at a point representing the North West Corner of the south East Quarter, of the south West Quarter, (SE 1/4 of SW 1/4) of section Twenty Nine (29), in Township Forty, (40) south of Range Eleven (11), East of the Willamette Meridian, Klamath County, Oregon, thence east on said subdivision line, One and One-Half miles to the North East Corner of the South West quarter of the South East quarter of section 28, in said Township and range; Thence South Forty Chains, thence East twenty chains, thence south twenty chains to the 1/4 corner on the section line between 33 or 34, said Township and range; Thence east twenty chains, Thence South sixty chains, more or less to the South East Corner of Lot numbered 4 of section 3, in Township 41 south of Range eleven (11), E. W. M. in Klamath County, Oregon; Thence West twenty chains to the section line between sections 3 and 4, in said township and range; thence south to at or near the South East corner of section 4 in said Township and Range, where said line intersects the north line of the right of way of what is known as the Adams Canal, Thence northerly and westerly along the north boundary of the said Adams Canal to a point twenty chains west of the East line of Section 6, in said Township and range; thence north to the North boundary of said Township; thence West twenty chains to the quarter corner on the Township line between said Townships 40 and 41, said Range number 11, E. W. M.; thence north through Section 32, Township Forty, South of Range 11 East, distant Sixty chains; thence West twenty chains; thence North Forty chains to place of beginning.

Timber Sale, Klamath Indian Reservation.—Sealed bids, in duplicate, marked outside "Bid Eggsman Unit," and addressed to the Superintendent, Klamath Indian School, Klamath Agency, Oregon, will be received until twelve o'clock noon, Pacific time, Thursday, March 11, 1920, for the purchase of timber on 640 acres of tribal and allotted land on the Sprague River in Sections 22, 27 and 28, Township 34 South, Range 8 East of the W. M., Klamath Reservation. The sale comprises about two and one-half million feet of yellow pine, for which no bid of less than three dollars and ten cents (\$3.10) per thousand feet will be considered. All timber must be removed prior to July 1, 1921. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check for one thousand dollars, payable to the Superintendent of the Klamath Indian School. Deposit will be retained as liquidated damages if bidder fails to execute contract and bond within sixty days from the date of bid. A right to object to any and all bids is reserved.
