CARRANZA TO RESTORE LAND

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 26 (By Mail.)—President Carranza's administration intends to recover to the nation great tracts of land conceded by previous administrations to foreign interests, according to statements of Mexican officials. It intends also to enforce the constitutional prohibition barring foreigners from holding land within 62 miles of the Mexican frontier and 31 miles from the coastline.

The general trend of their statements is to the effect that it is the purpose of the administration to avoid colonization projects that might eventually endanger the nation and to recover dominion over all lands without violating the legal rights of the present producers.

These statements were made in explanation of the government's request that the 1919 Congress float a loan of 50,000,000 pesos to enable the nation to recover land held under concessions by foreign interests.

The officials stated that the greater part of several states, such as Lower California and Chiapas is held by foreigners under concessions given by previous administrations.

When the terms of these concessions have not been complied with, they have been nullified, according to the Department of Agriculture. Part of the proposed loan was intended to indemnify holders for these concessions for improvements they had made.

Interests who have been deprived of their concessions by this nullification have declared that interior conditions for the last ten years have made it impossible for them to fulfill their agreements. Various British representatives are said to be pushing for indemnification for work done on concessions especially in Lower California and Chiapas.

Denial is made by Pastor Rouaix, Secretary of Agriculture and Development, that the government plans to nullify all concessions granted under the Diaz and Madero regimes. Only those where prescribed obligations have not been met will be annulled, he asserts.

AUTO SHOW TO BE BIG AFFAIR

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 13.—Some idea of the size of the big automobile show to be held in Portland the entire week of February 23rd to 28th may be gained from the fact that the Ice Palace, where the motor car part of the show will be held, is the largest show room on a single floor in the United States. Its 360 by 130 feet, without a single post to obstruct the view, give more space than is available for cars even on the main floor of the huge Coliseum Building in Chicago, which is 300 by 120 feet in size.

But large as it is, the Ice Palace can accommodate only the passenger car section of the Portland show. A year ago, both passenger cars and trucks were shown on the same floor. This year there are so many passenger car exhibits, and so many special models, that the Ice Palace will be devoted exclusively to passenger cars, while trucks will be exhibited in a separate truck show in the Portland Armory, a few blocks away.

The passenger car show in the Ice Palace will be by long odds the most complete ever held in the Pacific Northwest, and the truck show will be the first exclusively truck event on the Pacific Coast. Both will be under management of the general show committee, and one ticket will admit visitors to both shows without additional cost.

In the passenger car show there will be a total of 69 different makes of cars, to say nothing of the fact that at least 175 different models will be shown. The Portland show will contain almost as many different makes of cars as were exhibited at the recent New York show, the big event of the year in motordom.

Eighty different makes of cars were shown there, as compared to 69 at the coming Portland show. There will also be 50 different makes of trucks, and approximately 199 different models, on exhibition in the truck show.

The committee in charge of the two Portland shows is composed of H. H. Elling, chairman; H. M. Covey, A. S. Robinson and M. O. Wilkins. There is also a special entertainment committee which has made elaborate arrangements for a musical programme, an dhas expended large sums for decorating the Ice Palace for the passenger car show.
