WYOMING SOLONS FINISH SESSION

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Feb. 14.—Wyoming's first special session of the general assembly has just closed after having ratified the federal suffrage amendment, passed a law providing for the formation of irrigation districts, appropriated \$10,000 for relief of Wyoming veterans of the war, and sending a memorial to congress condemning the "dilatory procedure" of the federal bureau of soldiers' compensation and vocational training.

The session was notable in that nearly every question which came up was settled by a unanimous vote. Total appropriations for the session and relief of the soldiers were \$18,850.

Compared with former sessions, the closing night was a tame affair, for instead of hurling books, papers, etc., at each other during the wind-up, the legislators were content to discuss presidential possibilities and other matters of a similar trend, and all appeared to be anxious to leave for their homes.

The house concurred in the senate amendment to the appropriation bill whereby \$10,000 was set aside for disabled war veterans. It was pointed out that many of the maimed warriors might die before any federal aid was enacted for their benefit. The funds are to be in control of the governor and paid out by him as deemed best.

The new irrigation legislation is designed to prevent huge crop losses through drouths, and provides for a system of reservoirs which will provide water during dry seasons, those benefited to pay in ratio to the benefits received.

DISCOVERS NEW FISH AT GREAT DEPTH.

PARIS, Jan. 22. (By Mail).—The Prince of Monaco has discovered a new fish which lives at a depth of 20,000 feet under a pressure of 600 atmospheres. Although at such a depth there is practically no light, the Grimaldichyts Profundissimus, as this dweller of the depths has been christened, he has rudimentary eyes. The fish was brought up during one of the Prince's oceanographical cruises off the Cape Verde Islands. Two other species, not hitherto known were caught in the same region at a depth of over 15,000 feet.

BLANCHE SWEET MAKES HER SCREEN "RE-DEBUT"

AMERICA BUYS HIDES IN S. A.

BUENOS AIRES Jan., 8. (By Mail)—American buyers are reported to be buying Argentine cattle hides on contracts which would include the greater part of what are known as "freezing house skins" up to the middle of June, 1920. The American buyers, according to La Razon, are anticipating German purchases which are expected to be facilitated by the resumption of maritime traffic with German ports.

"At present," says La Razon, "the demand for cattle hides is very active all over the world. The United States bought during the war the greater part of Argentina's production, but now cannot do this for the reason that the tanning industry has progressed very much in several countries such as Spain, Sweden, Norway and Holland, and these countries today are disputing the market. As Germany is commencing to operate on a large scale in the international hide market, the United States will not find the same facilities that she had in 1915-18 to impose her prices on the market."

"It is estimated that Argentina next year, will be able to dispose of more than 6,000,000 cattle hides."

GIANT MEMORIAL, BERKELEY, Cal., Feb. 14.—A grove of Sequoia redwoods, the largest trees in the world, will be planted here by the Forestry club of the University of California as a memorial to those students who lost their lives in the war.

DRUGGISTS MUST NOT WATER BOOZE

AUSTIN, Texas, Feb. 14.—Whiskey, under the new prohibition law, is classed as a drug, and R. H. Hoffman, pure food and drug commissioner, has announced that he is "going after" retail druggists who are watering their whiskey. The law requires that medicinal whiskey be 44 to 50 per cent ethyl alcohol, he said, and druggists are now paying \$1.70 a gallon, plus a \$3 tax, for whiskey and selling it for \$2 a pint, or \$16 a gallon. Mr. Hoffman is of the opinion that they make enough profit without adding water to their stock.

REPARTIATION OF GERMANS FROM INDIA.

LONDON, Jan. 23. (By Mail).—The repatriation of Germans from India is steadily proceeding, and before long no German will remain in India except those who for very special reasons are granted exemptions, said Samuel Montagu, Secretary of State for India, replying to a question in Parliament. The precise period during which Germans will not be allowed to enter India has not been finally decided, but it will not be less than three years.

Before the war Germany was making strenuous efforts to capture Indian trade and did a large business through German agents stationed in India.
