MARINES CUT HEAD OFF DEMON RUM

PEKIN, China, Jan. 16. (By Mail)—"The Dragon Rum" was officially executed here today after a ceremony organized by United States Marines of the American Legation Guard.

With the band playing a funeral dirge the dragon was marched three times around the parade ground, ten Marines providing the motive power from inside the beast.

All American reservations in China are officially "dry". The rest of the country is not, but the Marines held the celebration to mark the passing of the "rum demon" in their homeland.

SAYS WOMEN HAVE LESSER INTELLIGENCE

LONDON, Jan. 30. (By Mail).—Women are naturally mechanical, therefore no woman is really musical, contended J. Swinburne in an address before the Musical Association in London the other day.

"It is commonly believed that women's brains are just like men's and that they can do everything that men can do just as well," he said. "The assumption is quite unfounded. Women are nowhere in science although scientific training has been open to them for more than a generation. The cultivation of music by women hinders the development of the art. One effect of the supposed musical gifts of women is that girls are taught music while boys are neglected in this training."

Five new sugar mills, with a total capacity of 5,000 tons of cane daily, are to be erected in Negros, Philippine Islands. Ten mills with a capacity of 3,000 tons of cane daily are already in operation in Negros.

The project of harnessing the Rhone river from the Swiss frontier to the sea, and developing it for navigation and irrigation purposes, a matter which has been under consideration for more than a century, is again receiving the attention of the French government.

MEXICO CITY GETS RARE SNOW STORM MEXICO CITY, Feb. 17.—It is possible on almost any day in the year to see snow banks from Mexico City, yet few of the natives here had ever touched it until the other day when there was quite a perceptible fall, the first in many years in the Valley of Mexico. The mountain peaks of Popocatepetl and Iztaccihuatl, clearly visible from the capital, are always snow-clad, but they are some 60 miles away. Barefooted or lightly-shod natives stepped gingerly into the strange element and afterward spent most of the day huddled in their homes or in sheltering nooks and corners. The snow flurry was due to a sudden drop in temperature during a light rain. The native employes at a Bombay mill struck recently because they did not receive a bonus on the reported birth of the owner's son. One hundred million wood boxes were required to pack last year's output of the canning industries in the United States, estimated at 8,000,000,000 cans.
