LONDON WILL HAVE NEW SUBWAY SYSTEM

LONDON, Jan. 30.—(By Mail.)—Prediction that a rapidly increasing number of underground railways would have to be built in London to take care of the growing traffic was made by Lord Ashfield of Southwall (Sir Albert Stanley), the Anglo-American railway magnate, in an address before the American Luncheon club.
"London today is not only the greatest aggregation of people," he said, "but it is also the greatest travelling city of the world. People who live in London have really lost all desire to walk any considerable distance. Within the next ten years, I judge that London's travelling population will have increased to at least 6,000,000,000."

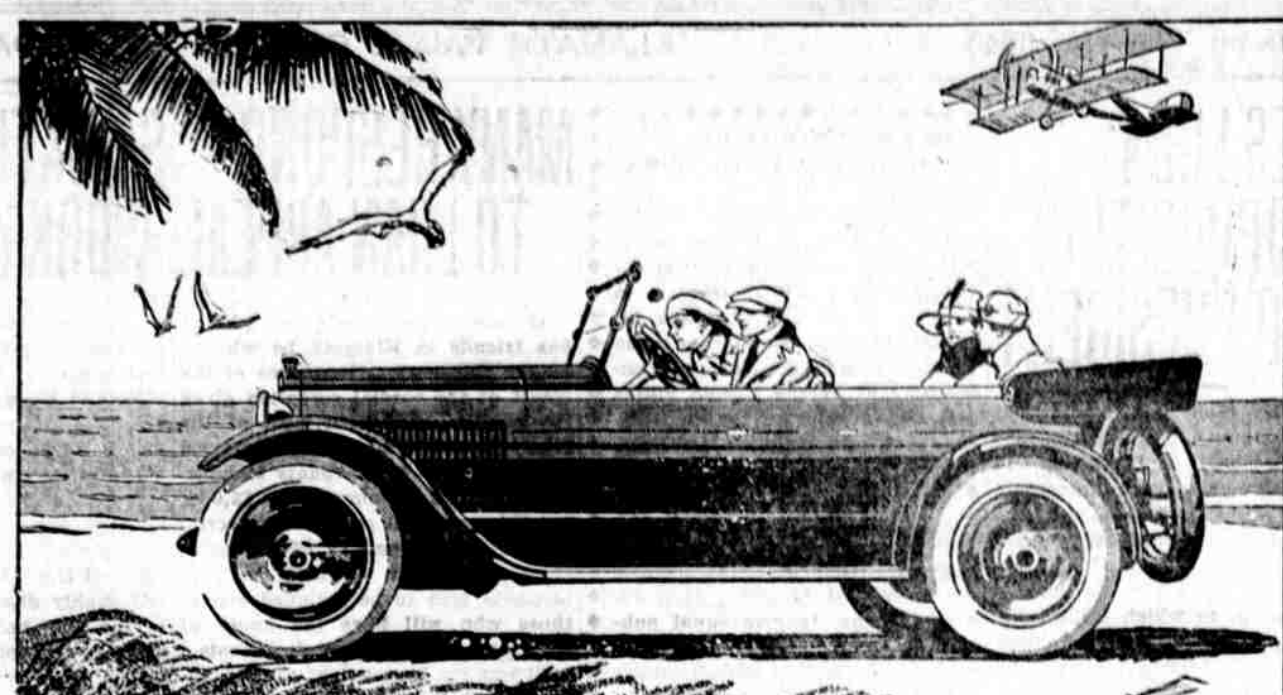

MANY LONDON FIRMS HIRE DISABLED MEN

LONDON, Jan. 30.—(By Mail.)—Since the inauguration of the national scheme for the employment of disabled men last September 9,500 firms have given necessary undertaking to employ an agreed percentage of disabled men on their staffs. The quota is generally five per cent, and employment has been guaranteed for 97,000. There are still 40,000 disabled men waiting for work and the hospitals have many more to discharge.

Men who have lost a leg are working as clerks, cabinet-makers, toy-makers, weavers, etc.; and men with only one arm are acting as messengers, watchmen, postmen, inspectors and teachers.

Timber Sale, Klamath Indian Reservation.—Sealed bids, in duplicate, marked outside "Bid Eggman Unit," and addressed to the Superintendent, Klamath Indian School, Klamath Agency, Oregon, will be received until twelve o'clock noon, Pacific time, Thursday, March 11, 1920, for the purchase of timber on 640 acres of tribal and allotted land on the Sprague River in Sections 22, 27 and 28, Township 34 South, Range 8 East of the W. M. Klamath Reservation. The sale comprises about two and one-half million feet of yellow pine, for which no bid of less than three dollars and ten cents (\$3.10) per thousand feet will be considered. All timber must be removed prior to July 1, 1921. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check for one thousand dollars, payable to the Superintendent of the Klamath Indian School. Deposit will be retained as liquidated damages if bidder fails to execute contract and bond within sixty days from acceptance of bid. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved.
