All that portion of Fourth Street lying and being between blocks 111 and 112 in said addition;

All that portion of Second Street lying and being alongside and adjacent to lot 6, in block 109, and to blocks 101, 109 and 110 in said addition.

All that portion of Willow Avenue lying and being between blocks 100 and 101 in said addition.

All that portion of the alley running through blocks 101 and 102 in said addition;

All that portion of Elm Avenue lying and being between blocks 101 and 109 and blocks 102 and 108 in said addition;

GOVERNOR IS OPTIMISTIC

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 19.—In a letter to Percy Cupper, state engineer and member of the executive committee of the Western States Reclamation association, D. W. Davis, governor of Idaho, and president of the reclamation organization, expresses confidence that congress will appropriate a substantial sum of money for reclaiming western lands now unproductive because of lack of irrigation, despite the unfavorable report submitted by the secretary of the treasury.

"Secretary Lane in his report issued on the eve of his resignation," writes Governor Davis, "suggests that the bill be cut to \$100,000,000. The favorable tone of this document is a victory, and I am very optimistic over the whole matter. We must push the campaign, and as soon as the special session of our legislature is over this week I shall give a great deal of time to reclamation association affairs, for I consider it the most important thing we have to do."

"Please urge on the friends of irrigation in your state the necessity for keeping a live interest in your local association, so we may have the great states involved in this irrigation union."

"In addition, I suggest you immediately confer with American Legion commanders in your community. Explain to them that this is the opening wedge in the soldier settlement plan and gain their support through resolutions and letters. We can do much for them, and they can help themselves. Wire or write me if you wish more suggestions."

Timber Sale, Klamath Indian Reservation.—Sealed bids, in duplicate, marked outside "Bid Eggsman Unit," and addressed to the Superintendent Klamath Indian School, Klamath Agency, Oregon, will be received until twelve o'clock noon, Pacific time, Thursday, March 11, 1920, for the purchase of timber on 640 acres of tribal and allotted land on the Sprague River in Sections 22, 27 and 28, Township 34 S., Range 8 E. of the W. M., Klamath Reservation. The sale comprises about two and one-half million feet of yellow pine, for which no bid of less than three dollars and ten cents (\$3.10) per thousand feet will be considered. All timber must be removed prior to July 1, 1921. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check for one thousand dollars, payable to the Superintendent of the Klamath Indian School.
