In the matter of the State Highway: Whereas, on June 3, 1919, the voters of Klamath County, Oregon, did decide, by a majority vote, to issue bonds of the County of Klamath, State of Oregon, in the amount of \$347,704, for the construction of permanent roads in said Klamath County, State of Oregon, in pursuance of the provisions of Chapter 103, General Laws of Oregon, 1913; and

Whereas, said bonds were sold to Morris Brothers, and there is available the aforesaid sum of money for said purpose, and to be applied in part for the improvement of the following state highway:

Dallas-California Highway, Klamath Falls-Albion Highway, and Klamath Falls-Lakeview.
Therefore be it resolved, that 25 per cent of the cost of the improvement of the said Dallas-California Highway, between the City of Klamath Falls and the town of Algoma, in Klamath County, State of Oregon, be, and the same hereby is appropriated and set aside for said purpose, and that any and all orders heretofore made appropriating any of the aforesaid fund of \$347,704 for said purpose be and the same hereby is vacated;

That 25 per cent of the cost of the improvement of the said Klamath Falls-Lakeview Highway, between the City of Klamath Falls and the town of Dairy, in Klamath County, State of Oregon, be, and the same hereby is appropriated and set aside for said purpose.

Now on this the 27th day of the regular sept. Term of the County Court for Klamath County, State of Oregon, it appearing that the legislature of the State of Oregon, did, at its regular 1919 session, enact a law providing for the extermination and eradication of ground squirrels, other noxious and predatory animals, authorize county courts of the state of Oregon, to provide funds therefor, and it further appearing that there are now funds available for the accomplishment of said purpose in the item of "Special Rabbit Seal Bounty," \$5000.00, it having been the practice and custom to disburse portions of said funds under said title, to the purchase of poison, and other materials, for the eradication of rabbits, etc.,

It is therefore ordered, that there be and hereby is, set aside from the item of "Special Rabbit Seal Bounty," \$5000.00, as mentioned in the budget of Klamath County, State of Oregon, for the year of 1919, levy therefor having been duly and regularly made, the amount of \$500.00, which shall constitute a revolving fund for the extermination of rabbits, other noxious rodents and predatory animals, that this fund shall be known as the "Revolving Rabbit Extermination Fund", and that the money so set aside therefor, shall be separate and apart from other funds, and paid out upon the order of the County Court, and shall be used exclusively for the objects as provided in the aforesaid legislative enactment.
