TAX SUMMARY

SUMMARY OF REPORT SHOWS STATE TAXES GREATER AND LOCAL TAXES SLIGHTLY LESS.

In another column is printed the Assessor's annual report showing amount raised for taxation by the various taxing bodies during the year and the purposes for which raised. A comparison is also shown between this year's assessment roll and last year's showing the valuation for taxes as fixed by the County Court, the City Council and the Board of Directors of the various school districts.

\$22,233.70. Notwithstanding this increase the County Court managed to slash this fund something over \$34,000.00 as compared to last year, and in spite of increases necessary in other funds managed to reduce the tax rate by 0.2 mills on the dollar. The City of Klamath Falls managed to reduce their tax rate 0.5 mills or \$3737.09 more than last year. There has been some increase in value within the City due to the following principal reasons: The mills and box factories had larger stocks of merchandise on hand on March 1st, 1919, than on previous years on account of car shortage; Considerable new construction has been done between March 1st, 1918 and March 1st, 1919, within the City and the valuation on some properties has been raised in cases of a considerable market value of same. Increases in special school levies has been due to a number of reasons: The growth of this community has been very rapid and the school facilities have had to keep pace with

the Sheriff's office is \$112,687.18 it which they have just managed to do. The bonds floated to build schoolhouses at one time or another bear interest which has to be paid as well as the principal of the bonds. A drop in the bucket is the raise of salary granted the teachers at the recent special election. As a result of this raise the teachers are paid not adequately, but enough to get by on, which keeps Klamath Falls out of the awkward predicament of many communities which have had to close their schools down on account of their inability to get teachers for the salaries set. A recent number of the Literary Digest sets the number of such teaching vacancies in the United States at 40,000. On the 1919 tax roll are the assessments of a number of Irrigation districts not making a levy last year which assessments will be collected by the Sheriff with the other taxes. The total amount collected by the Klamath Irrigation District (the main Government project) through

this year against \$37,810.59 last year. This increase is due to the fact that the collection of the Building and Operation and Maintenance Charges of the United States, as well as the Water Users Association assessment will all be collected by the Sheriff this year instead of part of the charges by the Reclamation Service office and part by the Sheriff as was done last year. ALLEGED COMBINATION FOR PROFITEERING

LONDON, Feb. 4.—(By Mail.)—Accusations that both the government and Yorkshire spinners were making "colossal profits" in wool were made by Mr. Mackinder, a woolen warehouse man, at a recent meeting of the central profiteering committee. He said a committee which investigated the prices of wool found that the Yorkshire spinners

were making 400 to 3,200 per cent over the margin of profit allowed by the government. Member of the profiteering committee complained that the government was wilfully withholding publication of the reports of the investigating committees. Publication of these reports was demanded in a resolution. They predicted a "howl of execration" when the public learned the facts. "What is happening in worsted
