FIGHTERS ARE READY TO GO

Everything is set for the boxing
contests at the Houston Opera House
tomorrow evening and Matchmaker
Winter Knight has a card this time
that should fill the house to over-
flowing. Despite the fact that the
main event is a heavyweight con-
test between fighters of demon-
strated ability, there has been no change
in prices of admission, the commis-
sion and promoter believing that the
fans who have supported the game
loyally in the opening stages are
entitled to reciprocal fair treatment.
Tonight this time has evoked a pro-
gram that would provide spectators
with their money's worth.

The outcome of the Boy McCormick-
Ed Petrosky battle at Mare
Island Tuesday night sticks a peg in
the term chart on which fans should
be able to hang an opinion regarding
tomorrow night's main event here.

McCormick, light-heavyweight,
McCormick, light-heavy weight
champion of Great Britain and Can-
ada, got the decision over Sailor Pet-
rosky but he worked thru ten hard
rounds to do it. Petrosky made a
fight of it all the way through and
scored one knockdown on the cham-
pion.

Sailor Ritchie, who fights Soldier
Whisper, the slashing San Francisco
heavyweight here tomorrow night,
went up against Petrosky in San
Francisco three years ago and got a
decision without difficulty.

Ritchie has met some good men in
his boxing career as a partial record
shows. Here are some of his fights:
William Hess, of Philadelphia, 1916,
knockout third round; Sailor Joe
Gosink, knockout third round; Sailor
Bull of the battleship Oregon, knock-
out second; Willie Meehan, four
rounds draw the first time, decision
the second contest a month later;

Charles White of New York, knock-
out; Sailor Ed Petrosky, decision;
Basil Levinsky of the battleship
Sgt. Davis, knockout; George Benson,
Oakland, 1917, decision; Henry Hen-
dricks, four decisions and one knock-
out in five contests; Jack Murphy,
knockout; "Knockout" O' Conklin
(Ritchie's first appearance in San
Francisco) knockout in the second
round; and Fred Nelson of Rich-
mond, knockout in the fourth.

True to expectations "Kid" Har-
rington signed up last night to meet
