EX-SERVICE MAN VOICES HIS IDEAS.

To all interested in the development of the Klamath Area:

I think you will see, before finishing this article, that I am primarily interested in myself. While I was educated along other than strictly agricultural lines, yet I was born and reared "down on the farm." There are a world of things I do not know and many I am not sure about, but one thing I do feel positive of and that is: that should all business and industry collapse today, a plot of land that will produce food for an empty stomach will be something of intrinsic value, tomorrow.

I, like thousands of others in the spring of 1917, after struggling thru several years of hard work and effort in trying to obtain some measure of training to make better citizens of ourselves, were ready to launch our various careers, but the war came on and there was only one thing to do, namely, get into the fight. All of which was only our reasonable portion of service to our country. I believe I can approach in feeling, experience and aspirations something of the average ex-service man, as I have spent about two years in the uniform and near eleven months of that time was spent "over there" with the 31st Division. And from those experiences and conditions it is impossible for us to be other than changed men. We have probably made many mistakes since returning to our respective communities and will likely make many more, but I am sure it is our wish to do the right thing, and make good, positive citizens. While I volunteered my services freely and unreservedly, I do not in any manner lay special claim to our government's bounties or gratuities, other than those provided through the regular channels of insurance, compensation, etc., and I not only hope not, but do not believe the average ex-service man holds such an attitude towards his country. For, in the broadest sense, his service was a privilege.

However, in recognition of our services and to express in a concrete form the nation's appreciation of what its men have done during the World War, it seems to be nationally understood that some uniform plan will be adopted whereby we will be given the opportunity of having a little home and soon start with a little "nest egg" all our own. All of which we ex-service men are naturally, vitally interested in.

It seems to be the consensus of opinion that the most practical plan would be to arrange for each man to have a plot of productive land where he could have a home, for then he would be financially interested in America, and would be a producer and a factor in our government.

To bring about this desirable result there seems to be a number of things to consider, and not the least of these is that no particular interest can be considered to the exclusion of all others, for we find ourselves inter-dependent.

The crying need now is for development. And it goes without saying that the greatest of these now, in this particular section and for permanent value is agricultural development. There seems to be a painful lack of co-operation and co-ordination in striving for the result all want. The commercial interests want more money in circulation; the industrial interests want more useful articles made; and the agricultural interests want more products raised. And the ex-service man, among other things, is praying for the irrigation and opening of these now reclaimed thousands of acres of fertile lands in the Tule Lake bed where he can have a chance to make a little home. All of which is highly and universally desirable, but to date, very little if anything has been accomplished, beyond a certain point.

Citizens! let us get all interests—commercial, industrial and agricultural—working together; discarding all semblance of distrust and selfishness (some of the worst foes of our national industrial life today) and work for the common weal by installing the "Golden Rule" laying it in the solid foundation of economical law, expedient to the present and future requirements, and formulate a plan of action that will lead us out. I believe some of our principles of Government are a good guide for us to follow, even in choosing a plan of community activity. The Allied Cause did not get definite satisfactory results until they got together, neither will we. For the sake of ex-service men, in whom all are interested, but more, for the sake of all in this Klamath area, let us have an "altogether boys!" and community prosperity and success is ours.

Timber Sale, Klamath Indian Reservation.—Sealed bids, in duplicate, marked outside "Bid Eggsman Unit," and addressed to the Superintendent, Klamath Indian School, Klamath Agency, Oregon, will be received until twelve o'clock noon, Pacific time, Thursday, March 11, 1926, for the purchase of timber on 640 acres of tribal and allotted land on the Sprague River in Sections 22, 27 and 28, Township 34 South, Range 5 East of the W. M., Klamath Reservation. The sale comprises about two and one-half million feet of yellow pine, for which no bid of less than three dollars and ten cents (\$3.10) per thousand feet will be considered. All timber must be removed prior to July 1, 1921. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check for one thousand dollars, payable to the Superintendent of the Klamath Indian School. Deposit will be retained as liquidated damages if bidder fails to execute contract and bond within sixty days from acceptance of bid. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved.
