**THIEVES THRIVE UNDER NEW ORDER**

BERLIN, Jan. 25.—(By Mail).—The Bolshevik idea that the other fellow ought to be compelled to share his property even if one must resort to theft to obtain it seems to actuate some of Berlin's thieves. Two sisters, servants of a well-to-do family in Hanover who recently stole 400,

000 marks worth of valuables from their employers declared, when arrested, that they felt it was perfectly right, under the new order of things, to take a share in the property of those better situated.

Large quantities of jewelry and valuable articles are being stolen in Berlin. Servants are often the offenders and frequently are captured because they are amateurs.

**JEWISH MUSEUM IN JERUSALEM READY.**

LONDON, Jan. 20. (By Mail).—Palestine Museum has finally been established in Jerusalem and is ready for public inspection. Heretofore it was part of the Bezalel School of Arts and Crafts, founded by the Zionists. Inaugurated only about 14 years ago it already contains more than 3,000 exhibits. Jewish artists in all countries have now come forward with promises of assistance in the form of pictures and sculpture.

The tale ends happily with the forgiveness of his wife.

As its special feature attraction, Liberty Theatre will present "Lombardi, Ltd.," the Screen Classics, Inc., super-production, with Bert Lytell as the star, for a run of two days, beginning Sunday. "Lombardi, Ltd.," is variously described as a fashion show, a girl show and a highly diverting comedy drama of the screen, with the star in the unusual and interesting role of a male modiste.

Frederic and Fanny Hatton, most gifted of American collaborators, were responsible for the original stage play of "Lombardi, Ltd.," from which the photoplay was made. On the stage it was presented by Oliver Morosco and ran for a season in New York and more than a year on the road.

Most of the action transpires in the swagger Fifth Avenue dress-making establishment of Tito Lombardi, an eccentric Italian genius whose artistic tendencies exceed his business acumen, and who finds himself in dire straits and facing bankruptcy because his faith in human nature has made him too 'easy' with defrauding customers.

Alice Lake, Juanito Hansen and Vera Lewis have leading feminine roles in the production. Other beautiful young women in the cast are Thea Talbot, Ann May, Jean Acker, Virginia Gaidwell, Gilda Maddan and Patricia Hanson, the last three being gowns models of the "perfect 36" variety. Joseph Kilgour, George McDaniel and John Steppling have the remaining supporting parts in the male contingent.

June Mathis adapted the Hatton's play to the screen. Jack Conway directed the production, which was made under the personal supervision of Maxwell Karger, Screen Classics, Inc., Director General. The art interiors were designed and executed by M. P. Staicup, special technical director for the production.
