ITALY FORCED TO BUY WITH POOR CURRENCY

ROME, Feb. 10. (By Mail).—Enormous purchases of coal and foodstuffs which Italy is compelled to make abroad in depreciated currency constitute the severest check of this country's return to prosperity, says Alfred B. Dennis, the American Commercial Attache, in an interview in the Popolo Romano.

Mr. Dennis points out that the price of coal in Italy is ten times the price in the United States and that this cripples all Italy's coal-consuming industries and upsets the balance of production between Italy and her industrial competitors. The American Attache says, however, that in his opinion this condition is merely temporary and will be improved with the lowering of freight rates and the opening of new sources of supply.

"I judge that Italy would be helped at this juncture," said Mr. Dennis. "If attention could be called in the United States to the opportunities now offered for the investment of American dollars in Italian enterprises. In my opinion it would cause less future strain and anxiety if a great part of the credits which Italy desires abroad should naturally come through the purchase by Americans of Italian securities. Under the present rates of exchange the investment of American dollars in Italy appears to offer exceptional opportunities to the investor.

"Italy is the only one of the great belligerent nations which has come out of the conflict richer in manpower than it went into it. Half a million men were lost in the battle field, but this was compensated by the return of reservists and the arrest for three years of the stream of emigration. Italy has a population today exceeding the total civilized population of South America and is probably richer in manpower than any like portion of the surface of the earth. This eager abundant labor in many instances is touched with a genius for artistic creation, and constitutes one of Italy's most valuable assets."

SOCIALISTS STRONG, ITALY

ROME, Jan. 14. (By Mail).—Socialist organizers are strongly represented in the new Italian Chamber of Deputies. Thirty-seven new members give themselves that description in their report to the secretary of the Chamber. There was not a single organizer in the previous Parliament.

Altogether the Socialists have 156 deputies in a total membership of 508. All the 352 deputies outside of the Socialist group are opposed to them although holding widely varying political views. The Catholic party has 101 members. These latter supported the government and arrayed themselves against the Socialists in a test vote of confidence.

The number of lawyers and noblemen has decreased. Eight peasants and 13 workmen sit in the present Chamber. In the last previous Chamber there were no peasants and only two workmen.

Three literary men are among the deputies: Sem Benelli, poet and dramatist, who is now D. Annunzio's chief rival in Italy and is known in New York especially thru his play, "The Jest"; Alfredo Baccelli, and Sicilian.

SALE OF TIMBER KLAMATH INDIAN RESERVATION AGENCY UNIT.

Sealed bids in duplicate, marked outside "Bid Agency Timber Unit" and addressed to Superintendent, Klamath Indian School, Klamath Agency, Oregon, will be received until twelve o'clock noon, Pacific time, Wednesday, March 24, 1920, for the purchase of timber on a tract, in township 34 south, range 7 east of the Willamette Meridian in Klamath Indian Reservation, lying between the J. J. Steiger Sale area and the so-called Spring Creek Sales areas. The said unit includes 1350 acres of unallotted land with an estimated stand of five million feet as to which contract will be made with the Superintendent and about 800 acres of allotted lands with an estimated stand of three million feet as to which separate approved contracts with the Indian owners may probably be made. More than ninety per cent of the timber is western yellow pine and the remainder is white fir, Douglas fir and sugar pine. Each bid must state the price per thousand feet Scribner Decimal C. Log Scale that will be paid for timber cut and sealed. No bid of less than three dollars and fifty cents (\$3.50) per M. foot for yellow pine and one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50) for other species will be considered. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check on a solvent national bank, payable to the Superintendent of the Klamath Indian School, in the amount of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00). The deposit will be returned if the bid is rejected but retained as liquidated damages if the required contract and bond are not executed and presented for approval within sixty days from the acceptance of a bid. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Copies of the bid and contract forms and other information may be obtained from Superintendent Indian School, Klamath Agency, Oregon.
