The Government Took Over

The Possession and Management

of certain QUASI-public concerns, and, with the assistance of a
large part of the previously formed organizations, realized some
success in operation, but as a total result the experiment was a
failure. Every day that passes furnishes evidence to justify this
assertion. The property and businesses taken over have been or
will be returned to the owners for the real reason, if not admitted,
that the undertakings were too big and complicated for new and
unexperienced chiefs to manage. What the results of this experiment
will be as to the future value of the properties no one can,
with accuracy, predict. It cannot be entirely satisfactory to the
owners or, for some years at least, to the general public.

There was clearly demonstrated during the war the value and
practical benefit of private management as compared with public
management. If it be said that government (or municipal) conduct
of business has sometimes been successful, the answer is that the
same business in the hands of private, responsible individuals, with
capital and success at stake, would have resulted more favorably.

seriousness of the situation. I am

that the coming irrigation season
will more fully demonstrate the folly
of the opposition to the proposed
contract with the California-Oregon
Power company.

I am not so optimistic as Mr.
Bradbury, who, according to The
Herald, made the statement that
there is no cause for alarm so far
as irrigation water for this season is

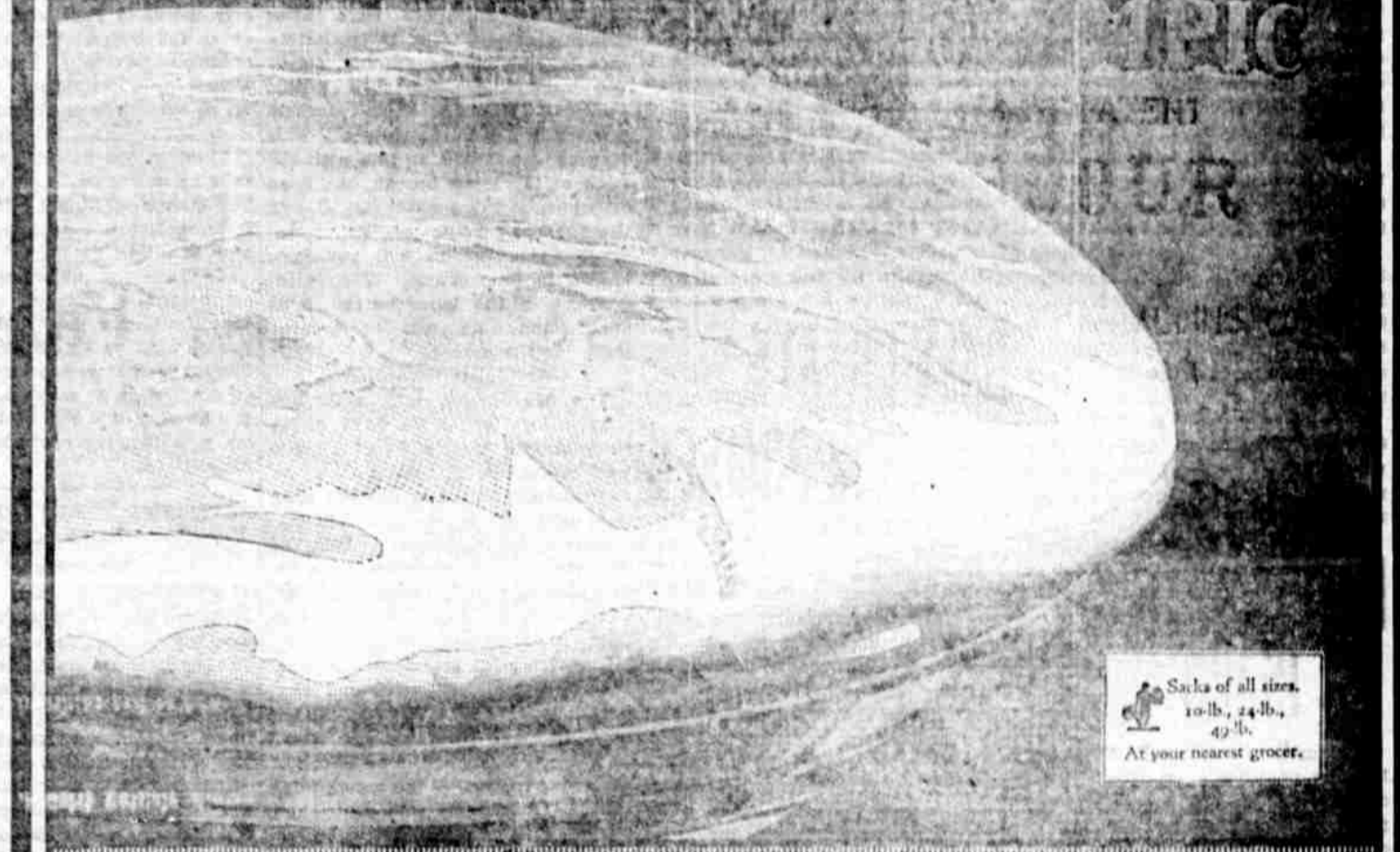

figures for 1918 the margin is dangerously close, even assuming, as he
seems to, that all of the water flowing
out of the lake is available for
irrigation and power. This is another
one of the many erroneous ideas
about the whole subject of water
supply that seems to prevail.

As a matter of fact the river flow
does not measure the availability of
water for irrigation and power
purposes, nor can it until a sufficient
channel is dredged to divert the
water into the canals. Under present
conditions, even at the lowest
stage of the river, a considerable
portion of the water passes on down
the river unused. I might note here
that the digging of the necessary
diversion channel by the power company
is one of the many things provided
for in the proposed contract.

All who are acquainted with conditions
here must admit that the key to the
development of our agricultural
resources is the utilization of the
Upper Klamath lake for the storage
of water for irrigation. This being
true, there can be no valid reason
or justice in any movement which
might cause delay, increase the
cost of, or block an enterprise of
such vital interest to all of us.
Delay has already been brought
about by the action of the American
Legion. This is an unwarranted
piece of interference that no progressive
community has any right to stand
by. It is no defense to say of the
Legion that it is not opposing the
storage of water in the upper lake
when its energies have been directed
toward the removal of an important
link in the chain that binds together
the whole comprehensive plan of the
government, and in so doing would
subordinate the big thing for its own
little project of doubtful merit. The
Legion does not seem to realize that
its action has jeopardized, at least,
the prosperity of the many for the
mere chance of gain for a few.

Are the real developers of this
country going to sit idly by and let
this all-important matter go by default?
If definite and united action
is not taken very soon, we simply
drop back into the position of indefinite
wasteful waiting.
"Asleep at the switch?" Yes! We
were asleep at the switch when we
lost at one time two million dollars
for the Klamath project; the east
branch canal was lost while we slept.
Time and again have we slumbered
until our way is strewn with wrecks.
Are we going to add another? We
certainly will unless we wake up.
