SALE OF TIMBER KLAMATH INDIAN RESERVATION AGENCY UNIT.

Sealed bids in duplicate, marked outside "Bid Agency Timber Unit" and addressed to Superintendent, Klamath Indian School, Klamath Agency, Oregon, will be received until twelve o'clock noon, Pacific time, Wednesday, March 24, 1920, for the purchase of timber on a tract, in township 34 south, range 7 east of the Willamette Meridian in Klamath Indian Reservation, lying between the J. E. Steiger Sale area and the so-called Spring Creek Sales areas. The said unit includes 1360 acres of unallotted land with an estimated stand of five million feet as to which contract will be made with the Superintendent and about 800 acres of allotted lands with an estimated stand of three million feet as to which separate approved contracts with the Indian owners may probably be made. More than ninety per cent of the timber is western yellow pine and the remainder is white fir, Douglas fir and sugar pine. Each bid must state the price per thousand feet Scribner Decimal C. Log Scale that will be paid for timber cut and sealed. No bid of less than three dollars and fifty cents (\$3.50) per M. foot for yellow pine and one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50) for other species will be considered. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check on a solvent national bank, payable to the Superintendent of the Klamath Indian School, in the amount of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00). The deposit will be returned if the bid is rejected but retained as liquidated damages if the required contract and bond are not executed and presented for approval within sixty days from the acceptance of a bid. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Copies of the bid and contract forms and other information may be obtained from Superintendent Indian School, Klamath Agency, Oregon, Washington, D. MILL STOCK IS BELOW NORMAL

Stocks at the lumber mills of Western Oregon and Western Washington are slightly below normal, according to the monthly report of the West Coast Lumberman's Association, and on account of the continued demand for lumber it is considered unlikely that a normal volume of stocks will be attained for more than a year.

Even though the present stocks are below normal, they would be materially lower if the mills had enough cars to fill the orders now on their books.

The report shows that the stock of the higher grades of lumber is relatively lower than the common grades.

Manufacturers now seem fully aware that they can expect no substantial relief from the chronic car shortage until the railroads have had a chance to supply themselves with some new equipment.

They are very cautious, therefore, about accepting new business. Last week, according to the 127 mills reporting to the association barometer, new orders were held down to 52,277,904 feet, which, it is estimated, was less than 50 per cent of the volume of business actually offered.

An aggregate of 42,639,000 feet or 1421 cars of this new business was booked by rail. The rail shipments from the same mills for the same period were 2035 cars. This excess of shipments over orders gave these mills a chance to move some of the business that the car shortage has forced them to accumulate on their books in the last few months.

Mills report the log supply somewhat light and prices are advancing. Labor costs also have advanced since the first of the year. The car shortage has increased the financial burden of the mills as it frequently has prevented them from loading stocks that were ready to move.

All reports from the consuming territory indicate that building activities throughout the country will be brisk this year and that the demands for lumber will exceed the probable cut at the mills even if this cut can be moved, which it cannot.

Lumbermen hope for an improvement in car conditions when the roads go back to the private owners and are joining with other industries of the Northwest in an appeal to the railroad authorities to provide for a representative of this region on whatever car distributing board or bureau is formed after the roads are restored.

OLD ALCHEMISTS' DREAM IS POSSIBLE

LONDON, Feb. 12.—(By Mail).—The alchemists' dream of producing gold from base metals is not extravagant, asserted Professor Frederick Soddy, head of the physical chemistry department at Oxford, in a recent publication. He tells how to do it.

"To get gold from mercury," he says, "expel from the atom of mercury one beta-particle, which will make thallium; then one alpha-particle which will turn the thallium into gold. Or, to get gold from lead, expel from the atom of lead one alpha-particle which will turn it into mercury, and proceed as before."

Investigators already are working along these lines.

SUFFRAGE AGITATION SHAKING JAPAN

HONOLULU, T. H. Feb. 1. (By Mail).—The movement recently launched in Tokio by university students for universal suffrage in Japan has spread to all parts of the country and to Korea and Manchuria as well, according to Tokio advices to the Hawaii Hochi, a local Japanese language daily.

The police bureau of the Home Affairs Department has instructed prefectural police chiefs to restrict suffrage agitation, the Hochi's correspondent adds.

Two of the opposition parties in the lower House of the Japanese Diet, the Kokuminto and Kenseikai, recently introduced a universal suffrage measure in the Chamber of Deputies.

In France cats are specially trained for government use. To fit them for service among military stores they are first sent for one or two voyages on a warship. If they prove equal to killing the rats in the holds of the ships, they are promoted to a shore billet.

Indian Lands Sale

ON KLAMATH INDIAN RESERVATION, KLAMATH AGENCY, OREGON

Under the rules of the Secretary of the Interior approved October 12, 1910, the lands listed below are offered for sale under sealed bids to the highest bidder. Bids will be received at the office of the superintendent until the hour and day specified below, at which time they will be opened.

These lands can be purchased in two ways, subject to acceptance of Indians, as follows: FIRST—(all cash)—With bid submit ten per cent of purchase price, remitting balance within thirty days after notice of acceptance of bid.

SECOND—(deferred payment plan)—With bid submit ten per cent of purchase price, fifteen per cent additional when bid is accepted; balance, 25 per cent at end of first year; 25 per cent at end of second year, and the remaining 25 per cent at the end of the third year, secured by notes with interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum.

Under the first plan patent in fee is issued to the purchaser shortly after full amount of purchase price is paid.

Under the second plan patent in fee will be issued to the purchaser when the purchase price and accrued interest on the notes have been paid in full. However, possession of the land purchased is given after the bid has been accepted and the first 25 per cent of the purchase price paid and the sale is approved by the Department. When lands are sold by deferred payments a certificate or memorandum of purchase, setting out fully the terms of sale, will be delivered to the purchaser. If the purchaser makes default in his final payment under the first class, and in his deferred payment under the second class, the 10 per cent paid will be forfeited to the Indian owner, and in case default is made in future payments of the second class an additional 15 per cent will be so forfeited.

The bid must be enclosed in a sealed envelope addressed to the Superintendent, Klamath Agency, Oregon, on which shall be written "Bid on Indian Land to be opened (give date when bid is to be opened)." The description of the land must NOT be written on the envelope.

Only one contract to be included in each bid.

All sales are subject to any existing lease.

Purchasers will be required to pay an advertising fee of \$1.50, \$2.00 or \$2.50, regulated by the price paid for the land.

Under no circumstances will the Superintendent or other officer in charge, or any person connected with the office be permitted to prepare any bids, or assist any prospective bidder in preparing his bid.

All allotments marked with * are irrigable. The purchaser will be required to sign an agreement to pay the present or prospective reclamation charges on irrigable land.
