FOUR PARADES ON FOR SHRINE WEEK

PORTLAND, Mar. 8.—Portland is planning for a visit by 75,000 Shriners at the Forty-sixth Annual Session of the Imperial Council which assembles in that city, June 22nd, 23rd and 24th, and which is immediately followed by the Annual Rose Festival. It is doubtful if any city has ever offered such an orgy of amusement in one week. There will be four great parades during Shrine week, two of which will be staged by the Shriners themselves and which will be pageants of wondrous beauty, and Portland will offer the others as her contribution to the big show.

At nine o'clock Tuesday morning, June 22nd, the daylight Shrine parade will be seen. That night Portland will put on her famous electric parade, a series of brilliantly illuminated floats. Wednesday night will occur the great Shrine night parade, and on Thursday afternoon the people will see the Rose Decorated Vehicle Parade, a production which costs thousands of dollars and weeks of planning. The Shrine will close its meeting on Thursday afternoon, and on Friday and Saturday the Rose Festival will be staged. The Shrine committee at Portland is going to see that all visitors are given a place to sleep, and will make reservations of rooms in private

homes of that city for all Northwest citizens who correspond with 302 Gasco Building.

BIG STORY OF '19

All the world loves a lover, and few actors of the screen are better known for the gentle art than J. Warren Kerrigan. In "The End of the Game," showing Tuesday at the Liberty Theatre, Kerrigan is a highly picturesque lover—picturesque because he wears the romantic-looking costume of a gentleman of Virginia in the period when they wore ruffled shirt bosoms and wide cuffs; and a daring good bad man—a good bad man because he draws his gun only in the cause of right. George Elwood Jenks wrote the story with the object of giving the star a chance to enact the fearless hero and still play the equally romantic lover.
