### FOREIGN STUDENTS CROWDING LONDON

LONDON, Feb. 23. (By Mail).—London is overcrowded with students from all parts of the world, and their accommodation is causing much racking of brains in responsible quarters. In the 60 colleges attached to the University of London, are some 20,000 resident students, and besides there are between 40,000 and 50,000 day scholars. The foreign element has increased enormously since the war, particularly for the engineering and scientific curricula. Hundreds of fresh applications are turned away every month. A special committee has been appointed by the University to investigate the question of hostels.

### FOREIGNERS LEAVE "DRY" UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Mar. 12.—Prohibition is causing many foreign born persons to leave the United States, according to Congressman Isaac Siegel, member of the House Immigration committee. Ellis Island records show 54,000 arrivals and 61,000 departures since January 1st. Most of the latter have gone to Poland and Czechoslovakia to stay. It is estimated that 36,000 will leave and 24,000 arrive in March.
