The government has spent altogether \$357,000 in bringing relief to the unfortunate sufferers. A survey recently made by Dr. Grant shows that 90 per cent of the population in rural areas harbor hookworm infection. Even light infection with hookworm is said to cause mental retardation. Defective mentality thus produced renders the childre nincapable of assimilating instruction.
