LOOKS LIKE A CINCH FOR DUCKS

RAMBO WRITES OF SUFFERING

The local committee for Armenian Relief, which is making a campaign for the county's \$2500 quota this week, has received a letter written by the Rev. W. E. Rambo, former pastor of the Christian church here, now doing relief work in Armenia, telling of the daily tragedies that are part of the experience of the workers. Here are two paragraphs:

"The day is filled with tragic stories and experiences. Here is one: A girl of 12 stands by her little frail brother of 8. She came from a town not far from Constantinople. The Turks took the father, with about 100 other men, one night and drove them two or three hours into the country and killed them all. They could not ever recover the father's body. A month later, the mother, grandmother and three little girls, and the boy were put on the train and taken to Konia (ancient Iconium), thence they were driven on foot by night to a town half way to Tarsus. During the night the mother and two little girls were separated from the rest, and were never seen again. They know not whether they live or are dead. Then the grandmother and our two trudged on to Tarsus but before reaching that place, the grandmother's feet became swelled so that she could not walk. She told the girl and boy to go on and try to escape and she would drop out. They never saw her again. At this point in the story I realized that my questions had reached the quick; and looking up from the typewriter, I saw the girl break, then the boy, and then my interpreter (one of our young teachers who has been thru a bitter experience in the Syrian desert to Damascus, being driven at night, as had the boy and girl) threw herself, face into her hands, upon the couch in my office, and the three wept aloud. Inwardly I cursed the civilized world (so called) for permitting a tragedy like that, while the nations fiddled and danced and played politics, and then I swallowed the lump in my own throat and soothed the dear hearts whose wounds I had to thoughtlessly torn open.

"One wonders at the fortitude of these people, children and adults, who so recently have returned from harrowing exile and bloody massacres. They are energetic and determined. They start up again like an ant's nest that has been torn up by a woodpecker which has destroyed all their larva. They read, study, sing, establish schools, re-organize worship, open shop, assemble sheep, chickens, and goats, plant, etc., regardless of the ruins near by in which they have seen their loved ones killed outright or burned huddled in their homes by a Turkish mob."
