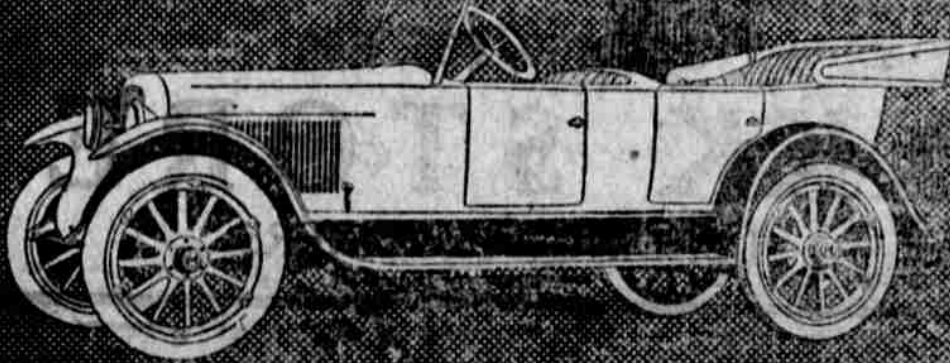

BIG TREES IN COMPETITION

WASHINGTON, Mar. 9.—"The Great Tree on Boston Common" and "The Green Tree Hotel" at Le Claire, Iowa, the most famous tree on the Mississippi river were today nominated for a place in the "Hall of Fame for Trees" being compiled by the American Forestry Association.

The Great Tree on Boston Common is nominated by J. Collins Warren, of Boston, who sends a complete history of the tree which was blown down in a storm February 15, 1918, the centennial of the year in which the colonists gathered around the tree and started for Lexington to give battle to the British.

"The Green Tree Hotel" at Le Claire, Iowa, is nominated by J. B. Barnes, who as a boy, played leap frog beneath the branches of this tree with one Willie Cody afterward known to fame as "Buffalo Bill." The historic elm is well known on the Mississippi river because the rivermen, reports Mr. Barnes, "it was the waiting place of men out of a job and looking for a trip. Therefore they give it the name of 'The Green Tree Hotel.'" It is considered to be 120 years old.

Other nominations for the Hall of Fame include the DeSota Oak at Tampa, Florida, from which DeSota started for the Mississippi and the West; the Octopus Tree in Charles City Co., Virginia, nominated by Meade Ferguson as the largest and oldest tree in the state; the two oaks at Marlinton, W. Va., marked in 1751 by General Andrew Lewis, nominated by Andrew Price; the tallest tree in the Balkans at P. d. ortza, nominated by the Red Cross which had headquarters near it during the war.

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ACTIVE VOLCANO GRAND SPECTACLE

HILO, Island of Hawaii, T. H., Feb. 15.—(By Mail.)—Halemaumau, the "House of Fire" of Kilauea volcano, presented a spectacle which for combined beauty and grandeur excelled anything he had seen in his years of experience observing the volcano. Professor T. A. Jaggar, Jr., said today.

The three lakes, formerly a familiar sight to visitors to the volcano, became merged into one stupendous body of boiling lava three hundred feet below the mouth of the volcano.

Above the surface of the restless lava was a delicate veil of mist, which was absorbed by the heat every few moments, revealing a tumbling mass of living, boiling colors beneath. Above the "House of Fire" and hanging over the dead lava fields stretching away from the rim of the volcano was a light fog a sa background for a perfect rainbow almost hugging the earth.

PLANTS FOR ALASKA

CORDOVA, Alaska, Feb. 1.—(By Mail.)—Four big cold storage plants are to be erected near Nome, Alaska, during the coming summer to handle the increasing shipments of reindeer meat being sent to the states, according to D. C. Crowley, Nome, a director of a company that has about 18,000 reindeer. About 2,000 carcasses will be shipped to the States during the coming summer.

RESOLUTION

It is hereby resolved, that said plans, specifications, and estimates for the improvement of Washington Street from First Street, easterly, to Third Street, including intersections, be and the same are hereby approved;

And be it further resolved, that the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of Washington Street, in accordance with said plans, specifications and estimates, said improvement to consist of paving said portions of Washington Street with cinders, oil macadam, bitulithic or other hard surfaced pavement. The estimated cost of the improvement of said portions of said streets by placing thereon cinder pavement to be \$7,590.00; and the estimated cost of paving said streets with oil macadam, including cement sidewalks, curbing and grading, to be \$8,735.00; the estimated cost of improving said portions of Washington Street with bitulithic pavement, including grading, rolling, curbing and cement sidewalks to be \$11,155.00.

And be it further resolved by the Common Council, that the following described property be and is hereby declared benefited by said improvement, to-wit:

- Lots 1-2 of Block 11,
- Lots 5-6 of Block 4,
- Lots 1-2-3-4-5 of Block 10,
- Lots 6-7-8-9-10 of Block 5;
- Lots 1-2-3-4-5 of Block 8,
- Lots 6-7-8-9-10 of Block 3.

All of said Lots and Blocks above described being in Ewauna Heights Addition to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and that said property above listed and described be and hereby is declared to be the property to be assessed for the expense of said improvement;

And be it further resolved, that Monday, the 12th day of April, 1920, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m., at the Council Chambers in the City Hall, be fixed as the time and place for the hearing of objections and remonstrances against the said proposed improvement, and the Police Judge is hereby directed to cause notice of said hearing to be published as by charter provided.
