STORM WILL CONTINUE SAYS WEATHER MAN

Farmers from outlying districts who had business in Klamath Falls today that could not wait the storm's end, were somewhat chilled as to toes and finger tips but their faces were warmly lit with broad smiles, for the rain and snow that started Saturday is showering dollars over Klamath county. In common with other communities of the coast.

The rainfall Saturday night, as measured by the reclamation service, was .28 of an inch up to 5 o'clock. Sunday's precipitation, due to a frozen gauge, was not available today.

Snow is piling up on the higher levels, according to reports. M. L. Johnson who returned last night from Chiloquin, said there were six inches on the level there at six o'clock. He found the roads good between here and Modoc Point but the going grows rougher toward Chiloquin. Freighters from Chiloquin to Fort Klamath were being carried on with four-horse teams, substituted for trucks tied up by the storm.

The weather bureau predicts the continuance of the storm for the next 24 hours.
