S. P. WILL ACT AS GOVT'S ADJUSTER

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 16.—That an arrangement with the Government, the Southern Pacific company is to act as trustee for the railroad administration in the collection of assets and adjustment of liabilities arising out of transactions with the railroad during federal control. This announcement was made at the company offices here today by T. O. Edwards, Auditor.

As a result of this arrangement, the usual channels thru which such transactions are handled will not be

disturbed, and patrons can continue to deal with the respective railroad officers.

It is believed that this procedure will be of great convenience to the public, reducing delays in settlement of claims, bills for materials and the like to a minimum.

TRADE CONFAB EXPECTED TO BRING RESULTS

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 27.—(By Mail.)—Local newspapers refer to the United States Mexican trade conference which recently closed its sessions here as of "transcendent importance," and predict that as a result there will be "closer relations between the two republics, better understanding and mutual amity." They express the hope that this conference will be made an annual affair.

That Mexico is a fertile field for American trade expansion was admitted by all speakers and all agreed that if the United States is to get its share of business there must be a revision of its trade methods. A point insisted upon by persons acquainted with the country was that the "cash in advance" policy must be abandoned, or at least modified. Germany and Great Britain, who appeared to be considered the principal commercial competitors, are liberal with their credits, it was declared, and Latin temperament does not take kindly to a policy that even hints at personal dishonesty.

American banks were severely scored during the discussion for an alleged lack of co-operation with American exporters in the matter of credits and other accommodations that might facilitate business. Representatives of these banks declared in defense that there was no disposition to discriminate and that a suitable credit standing is all that is necessary.

F. W. Dunkerley, local banker and representative of the American Bankers' association, said that Mexican banks are opening commercial credits in the United States, Europe, China and Japan, and that a system of trade acceptances is being worked out. He urged larger American investments. "The opportunity is here," he declared, "the time is propitious, and some one is going to furnish the necessary capital. We hope it will be largely American."

Prospective advertisers in the republic were given many helpful hints by merchants here, all of them complimenting the newspapers upon their general reliability and worth. "Send representatives to Mexico who speak the language—Spanish," was another injunction imparted by many speakers. "The reason Germany is strong here," declared one, "is because every business man who comes here speaks Spanish as fluently as his native tongue. He has been educated to understand the people; he lives as they do, and he more than any other foreigner marries into Mexican families. Moreover, he has one business policy that few American firms follow. He fills an order exactly as it is given. One of the principal objections Mexicans find with American firms is their consistent substitution with 'something

just as good.' That coupled with a harsh credit system makes entry difficult."

The conference did little formal business. An address by John J. Arnold of San Francisco, representing the American Bankers' association, in which he advocated the calling of an international banking conference and the establishment of an international clearing house, resulted in the appointment of a committee to draft a resolution endorsing this sentiment. The committee, however, failed to report. Another resolution which lacked formal sanction provided for a system of exchange of students between American and Mexican universities.

The City Engineer, pursuant to the resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having under date of the 8th day of August, 1919, filed plans, specifications and estimates of the cost of improving Washington Street from First Street, easterly, to Third Street, including intersections; and the Common Council having taken the same under advisement and finding said plans, specifications and estimates satisfactory;

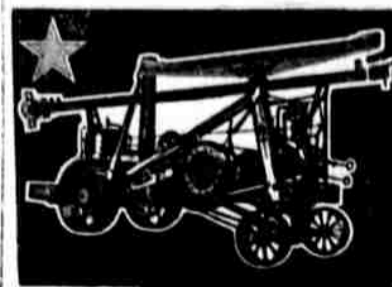
It is hereby resolved, that said plans, specifications, and estimates for the improvement of Washington Street from First Street, easterly, to Third Street, including intersections, be and the same are hereby approved;

And be it further resolved, that the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of Washington Street, in accordance with said plans, specifications and estimates; said improvement to consist of paving said portions of Washington Street with cinders, oil macadam, bitulithic or other hard surfaced pavement. The estimated cost of the improvement of said portions of said streets by placing thereon cinder pavement to be \$7,590.00; and the estimated cost of paving said streets with oil macadam, including cement sidewalks, curbing and grading, to be \$8,735.00; the estimated cost of improving said portions of Washington Street with bitulithic pavement, including grading, rolling, curbing and cement sidewalks to be \$11,155.00.

And be it further resolved by the Common Council, that the following described property be and is hereby declared benefited by said improvement, to-wit:
 Lots 1-2 of Block 11,
 Lots 5-6 of Block 4,
 Lots 1-2-3-4-5 of Block 10,
 Lots 6-7-8-9-10 of Block 5;
 Lots 1-2-3-4-5 of Block 9,
 Lots 6-7-8-9-10 of Block 6,
 All of said Lots and Blocks above described being in Ewauna Heights Addition to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and that said property above listed and described be and hereby is declared to be the property to be assessed for the expense of said improvement;

And be it further resolved, that Monday, the 12th day of April, 1920, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m., at the Council Chambers in the City Hall, be fixed as the time and place for the hearing of objections and remonstrances against the said proposed improvement, and the Police Judge is hereby directed to cause notice of said hearing to be published as by charter provided. NOTICE OF ELECTION

In the County Court of the State of Oregon for Klamath County.

In the matter of the Organization of the Patterson Irrigation District.

Whereas, under the provisions of Chapter 357, General Laws of Oregon for 1917, said County Court made and entered an order designating and establishing Patterson Irrigation District with the following boundaries, to-wit:

Beginning at a point representing the northwest corner of the southeast quarter of the southwest quarter (SE 1/4 of SW 1/4) of Section Twenty-nine (29) in Township Forty (40), South of Range Eleven (11), East of the Willamette Meridian, Klamath County, Oregon, thence east on said subdivision line one and one-half miles to the northeast corner of the southwest quarter of the southeast quarter of Section 28, in said township and range; thence south forty chains, thence east twenty chains, thence south twenty chains, to the quarter corner on the section line between Sections 33 and 34, said township and range; thence east twenty chains, thence south sixty chains, more or less, to the southeast corner of lot numbered four, of Section three, in Township 41, south of Range Eleven (11) E. W. M., in Klamath County, Oregon; thence west twenty chains, to the section line between Sections 3 and 4, said township and range; thence south to, at or near the southeast corner of Section 4 in said township and range, where said line intersects the north line of the right-of-way of what is known as the Adams Canal. Thence northerly and westerly along the north boundary of the said Adams Canal to a point twenty chains west of the east line of Section 5, in said township and range; thence north to the north boundary of said township; thence west twenty chains, to the quarter corner on the township line between said townships 40 and 41, said range number 11 E. W. M.; thence north through Section 32, Township 40, South of Range 11 East, distant sixty chains; thence west twenty chains; thence north forty chains to place of beginning.

Now, therefore, for the purpose of determining whether or not such district shall be organized under the provisions of said act, an election will be held at the Town Hall, Town of Merrill, in said district, in said county and state, on the 1st day of April, 1920, which election will be held at eight o'clock in the morning, and will continue until seven o'clock in the evening of said day, at which time the qualified electors therein shall cast ballots which contain these words, to-wit:

 or words equivalent thereto.

There shall also be elected at such time and place three directors for said district, whose term of office shall expire in one, two and three years, respectively, from the first Tuesday in February next succeeding their election. The nominations of candidates for said offices may be made by petition, signed by at least ten of the electors in said proposed district qualified to vote for the officers so nominated, or at an assembly of not less than twenty-five of said electors, which said nominations by petition or by assembly shall be filed with the undersigned at least ten days next preceding the date of said election.
