HOTEL FOR MEN WILL HOUSE 110

A workmen's hotel that will care for 110 roomers will be opened in Klamath Falls about April 15, if the plans of the new owners of the old Biehn garage building, corner of Ninth and Main streets, go through on schedule. An order has been placed with the Lakeside Lumber company for the necessary millwork and the entire upper floor of the building will be remodeled and partitioned into rooms.

The owners of the building, J. T. Ward, John Brett, and E. J. Murray, are proceeding in a practical way to solve the city's housing problem. They intend to provide rooms at moderate prices, but clean, commodious and comfortable. Each room will be of ample size for comfort and good beds will be provided. Bathrooms will be installed and the place will be connected with the city heating plant and steam heated during the winter.

A unique idea, which is intended to insure adequate and uniform ventilation lies in the construction of the partitions between the rooms, which will be boarded up for seven and a half feet, and enclosed with wire netting for the remainder of

the distance to the ceiling. The primary purpose of the venture is to provide clean, sanitary and modern quarters. If it proves a success and the demand justifies it the lower floor on the Klamath street end of the building will also be converted into rooms.

The contract has been let for the painting of the upper interior. The walls and the ceilings will be painted white, and the floors finished in gray.

Regardless of final disposition of the entire lower floor space, the half fronting on Main street will be divided into three store rooms and will probably be occupied at once. The present tenants occupancy ends April 1st.

When the projected line of railway across Australia has been completed the traveler on it will be confronted with what will be, probably, the dreariest railway journey in the world. The greater part of the route lies thru a desert region, practically devoid of life, and utterly uninteresting.

Bessie Barriscale, the beautiful blonde star who is appearing in Exhibitors Mutual releases, has an excellent medium for her talents in her latest production, "Josselyn's Wife" produced by the B. B. Features, Inc.

The picture is a dramatization of the book by Kathleen Norris, whose fiction has made her one of the most popular and widely read novelists of the day.

The locale of the story is Long Island and its environs. Ellen Latimer, a girl of refinement, who had been left penniless on her parents' death married young Gibbs Josselyn, and artist and scion of a wealthy family. Gibbs had never entered his father's house since Josselyn, Sr.'s second marriage to Lillian Keeler, a self-centered beauty who was mistress of the art of fascinating men.

After five years of happiness abroad, a reconciliation was effected, and Gibbs and his wife with their little boy, Tommy, went to live with the elder Josselyn at their Long Island mansion. Gibbs fell a victim of the beautiful Lillian's charms, and neglected Ellen for his step-mother.

The eternal triangle under the Josselyn roof resulted in many heart breaking moments for Ellen, whose suspicions were verified when she found Lillian and her husband at Gibbs' studio after a night on which they were both absent from home. A quarrel ensued between Gibbs and his father, and when Josselyn, Sr. was found dead, circumstantial evidence convicted Gibbs.
