PUBLIC NOTICE NO. 12. Klamath Project, Oregon-California

Department of the Interior Washington, D. C., Feb. 25, 1920. Annual Operation and Maintenance Charges.—In pursuance of Section 4 of the National Irrigation Act of June 17, 1902, (32 Stat. 388), and acts amendatory thereof or supplementary thereto, particularly the Extension Act of August 13, 1914, (38 Stat. 636), announcement is hereby made that the annual operation and maintenance charge for the irrigation season of 1920 and thereafter until further notice, against all lands of the Klamath Project, Oregon-California, under public notice, shall be a minimum charge of \$2.00 per irrigable acre whether water is used thereon or not, which will entitle the water user to two acre-feet of water per irrigable acre; and that additional water will be furnished up to a limit of three acre-feet per irrigable acre at the rate of fifty cents per acre-foot, and all further quantities for seventy-five cents per acre-foot. All operation and maintenance charges are payable on March 1 for the preceding irrigation season; but where water-right application is made for public land entered under the reclamation law after June 15, and where water-right application is made after August 1 for land in private ownership, no operation and maintenance charge shall be made for water delivered during the remainder of the irrigation season in which the water-right application is made.

NOTICE OF FILING OF COMMISSIONERS' REPORT FOR UPPER VAN BRIMMER DRAINAGE DISTRICT.

Notice is hereby given to all persons interested in the land included within the Upper Van Brimmer Drainage District, Klamath County, Oregon, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the point where the Van Brimmer ditch intersects Lost River in the SW 1/4 of Section 21, Township 40 South, Range 10, East of Willamette Meridian; thence southerly and along said Van Brimmer ditch to a point where said ditch intersects the north line of Section 28, said township and range; thence east one-fourth mile; thence south one-half mile; thence west to Van Brimmer ditch; thence southerly and along said ditch to a point where said ditch intersects the north and south line between Sections 33 and 34, said township and range; thence north to east and west line through the center of Section 34, said township and range; thence east one-fourth mile; thence south one-fourth mile; thence south to township line between townships 40 and 41, south; thence east to Lost River; thence northerly and following said Lost River to point of beginning.

That the Commissioners heretofore appointed to assess benefits and damages to the property and lands situated in said Drainage District and to appraise the cash value of the lands necessary to be taken for rights-of-way, holding basins and other works of said District, within or without the limits of said District, filed their report in this office on the 11th day of March, 1920, and you and each of you are hereby notified that you may examine said report and file exception to all or any part thereof, on or before the 12th day of April, 1920.
