

ORDER TO SHOW CAUSE ON APPLICATION OF GUARDIAN, FOR LICENSE TO SELL REAL ESTATE AT PRIVATE SALE.

AMERICA MAKING HIGH CLASS DYES

PHILADELPHIA, Mar. 22—Medical research libraries in this country in their search for a tuberculosis specific or cure for any other disease, are no longer dependent upon German-made dyes. "Made in America" dyes are now being used. They give as good results as did imported dyes used before the war.

This announcement was made at the Henry Phipps Institute, where laboratory experiments developed that certain dyes localized themselves in tuberculosis tissue. Efforts

are being made to modify these dyes with other chemical agents that will kill the tuberculosis germs.

Tripson red dyes have been found to give the best results. As many as 75 modifications of this dye have been used in experimentation. Other reds and some blues have also been used. The staining qualities act as guide to the localization.
