DEFENDS RIGHT TO TAKE PROFITS

LONDON, Mar. 4. (By Mail.)—Baron Leverhulme, formerly William H. Lever, a big soap manufacturer, has "broken a lance" in defense of the money-making business which brands him as a profiteer.

"The spirit of today," he said at a dinner "is one of cupidity and jealousy. A feeling is running through the country that the primary sin of a business man is success. The man who has the ability to create, develop, organize and produce is considered as one who must be specially curbed, checked and controlled."

"Our war debts," Baron Leverhulme continued, "have to be paid by the persistent efforts of all to build up an enormous home and an enormous export trade. Taxation of wealth only means taking money out of one pocket and putting it back into another."

CENTENARY OF THE FIRST RAILWAY

DARLINGTON, Eng., Mar. 3. (By Mail.)—The centenary of the beginning of the first passenger-carrying railway in the world was celebrated the other day at Yarm-on-Trees. There in 1825, eight men formed a company to construct the railway from Darlington to Stockton, a distance of 25 miles. George Stephenson was appointed engineer.

The railway occupied five years in construction and was opened on September 27, 1825. The celebration took the form of a dinner at which 30 descendants of the original eight pioneers were present.

Two young Swedish students of geology, after an adventurous nine days' expedition in Iceland, have discovered what is believed to be the largest crater in the world, measuring eight kilometers long and five kilometers wide.

An electric barrage which charges certain areas of water with electrodes has been devised to prevent fish fry from entering irrigation canals and ditches and later perishing by thousands in the fields.
