DEMPESEY HEARING IS SET FOR APRIL 3RD.

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 25.—Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, and his manager, Jack Kearns, pleaded not guilty before Judge Robert S. Bean in the United States District Court, when arraigned on charge of conspiracy to evade the Selective Draft Act. Their preliminary hearing was set for April 3d. The two appeared later before Francis Krull, United States Commissioner, and furnished bonds, Dempsey for \$2,000 and Kearns for \$1,000. They were indicted by the Federal

Grand Jury February 27th. One indictment accused them of conspiracy in preparing a false claim of dependency for Dempsey, and a second charged Dempsey with evasion of the Draft Act.

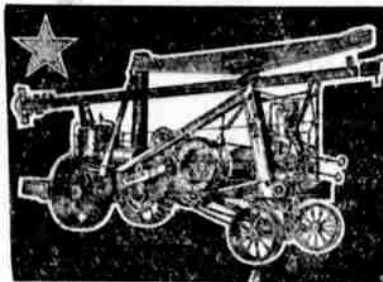
