DAIRY, Mar. 26.—A. L. Michael received a painful injury while loading logs at the Pine Flat switch on the Strahorn road Tuesday. Mr. Michael was standing with his back to the skidway scaling a log. Jack Dean and Roy Wimer were pulling another log up the skidway, when the log slipped catching Mr. Michael's foot underneath, fracturing a bone in the ball of his foot, dislocating the large toe and spraining his ankle. Dr. Johnson of Bonanza reduced the fracture.
