SACRAMENTO WANTS CITY MANAGER

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Mar. 29.—If a campaign launched this week is successfully carried through, Sacramento will have a city manager form of government on July 1, 1931. Leading civic organizations, consolidated into a Citizens' committee, launched the campaign and are circulating the petitions for election of a board of freeholders to draft the new charter. It is practically certain that the movement will carry. The new charter would be ratified by the next legislature. If adopted, Sacramento would be one of the largest cities in the United States operating under the city manager plan.

SEEKS TOBACCO BUYERS


SACRAMENTO, Cal., Mar. 29.—Fred Shaffer, secretary of the Yolo
