SCHOLARSHIPS HONOR HEROES

PRINCETON, Mar. 29.—President John Grier Hibben announced today that 17 scholarships have been established at Princeton university in memory of Princeton men who gave their lives in the world war. These scholarships will be awarded to poor but worthy boys who might not otherwise be able to secure a university education.

The scholarships which have been established, by friends and relatives of the Princeton hero dead, range in amounts from \$5,000 to \$40,000, the income from which is to be used each year by the university to help defray the expenses of needy students through Princeton. These scholarships in most cases, will be awarded on a basis of merit in the same manner in which the Rhodes' scholarships are now given out.

Princeton hopes eventually to have a scholarship established in the name of each one of the 146 men on the Princeton honor roll. By means of these scholarships, the names of the Princeton students killed in the war will be made immortal. These scholarships will be divided proportionately among the various states of the country.
