SEVEN FEET OF SNOW

AT CRATER LAKE, REPORT

MEDFORD, Ore., Apr. 5.—Forest Ranger Brown, stationed in the Crater Lake national park, reported today there are seven feet of snow at the lake and that snow is falling.

A month ago there was very little snow at the lake and it was announced the road to the rim would be opened by May 1. Now it is believed the road will not be open until about the usual time, the first week in July.

STRIKE, STORM, CRIPPLE

CHICAGO TRAIN SERVICE

RECORD SNOW STORM COVERS MIDDLE WEST

CHICAGO, Apr. 5.—The middle west and southwest, heartened by the weather bureau's prediction of a return to "balmy spring" weather, today set about digging themselves out of the record-breaking eastern snow-falls.

What official forecasters designated as a "warm blizzard" began yesterday in the Texas panhandle and swept rapidly through the middle west. The storm is continuing westward today. Snow still ranges from six inches to two feet deep throughout the states in the storm area.

LOGGER FINED \$50 IN BOOZE CASE

Fred Rogers, logger, shouldered the blame for the presence of liquor in a Spring street rooming house, conducted by Mrs. R. Gordon, and was fined \$50 and costs by Justice of the Peace Chapman. With the consent of the district attorney Mrs. Gordon, arrested on a similar charge, was dismissed.

Among the several bottles of liquor alleged to have been found by the police when Rogers was arrested, one is said to have been on the kitchen table. This formed the basis of the charge against Mrs. Gordon. Rogers, however, pleaded guilty and claimed ownership of all the liquor. The bottle in the kitchen was being used in mixing hot toddies, it was said.
